A CONFERENCE ON 'VISION AND ART IN THE EARLY RENAIS-SANCE,' which will be held at Smith College on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning, April 18–19, 1975, is the first organized in collaboration with the Renaissance Society of America under the terms of the Ruth and Clarence Kennedy endowment of a Visiting Professorship in the Renaissance (RQ 26, 391; 27, 138).

The program has been arranged by Charles Mitchell (Bryn Mawr C), first holder of the visiting professorship, and Charles Trinkaus (U of Michigan), RSA president, who will chair the conference. At the Friday session, which will begin at 2 p.m. with an opening address by President Thomas Mendenhall of Smith College, F. Edward Cranz (Connecticut C) will speak on 'The Eyes of the Mind: Antiquity and Renaissance' and Samuel Y. Edgerton (Boston U) on 'Optics, Art, and Scientific Discovery in the Late Trecento and Early Quattrocento.' Cocktails and dinner on Friday evening will be followed by a concert of Renaissance music directed by Louise E. Cuyler (U of Michigan *emeritus*; visiting professor Smith C). At the Saturday morning session beginning at 10:30, Marvin Eisenberg (U of Michigan) will speak on 'Lorenzo Monaco' and Charles Seymour, Jr. (Yale U), on 'Gothic or Revival? Some Aspects of the Definition of Style in Italian Sculpture, 1395– 1420.'

Persons planning to attend should notify Miss Mary McDougle, Secretary of Smith College, before March 1, 1975, indicating whether they will attend the dinner and enclosing a check payable to Smith College for the registration fee of \$3, which includes cocktails and the dinner.
