THE CONTRIBUTORS

BERNARD BRODIE is a Senior Staff Member of the RAND Corporation. He is the author of Sea Power in the Machine Age (1941), A Guide to Naval Strategy (3rd ed., 1944), and co-author of The Absolute Weapon: Atomic Power and World Order (1946).

RICHARD PIPES is Research Associate at the Russian Research Center and Tutor in History and Literature at Harvard University. His study, The Formation of the Soviet Union: Communism and Nationalism, 1917-1923, appeared in 1954, and he is now working on a history of Russian Conservatism.

Lindblom, of Politics, Economics, and Welfare (1953). He is completing a study of democratic theory, based on his Walgreen Lectures at the University of Chicago in January 1955. ROGER HILSMAN is a staff member of the Center of International Studies, Princeton University, and is currently engaged in research on the changing role of military force in foreign affairs.
