### THE CONTRIBUTORS

Daniel Bell is Labor Editor of Fortune Magazine and Lecturer in Sociology at Columbia University. Editor of The New American Right (1955) and author of Work and Its Discontents (1956), he is preparing a study entitled Communism and the American Labor Movement, undertaken for the Fund for the Republic.

FRITZ ERLER, military specialist in the German Social Democratic Party, has held a seat in the Bundestag since 1949 and has served on its foreign affairs and defense committees. He is a member of the Consultative Assembly of the Council of Europe and of the Assembly of Western European Union, and has published articles in Foreign Affairs, Politique Etrangère, Aussenpolitik, and other journals.

WILFRED MALENBAUM is Director of the research project on India of the Center for International Studies at M.I.T., as well as Visiting Professor in the Department of Economics. He is the author of *The World Wheat Economy*, 1885-1939 (1953) and of a forthcoming study of Indian development prospects.

JOHN H. WEAKLAND, Research Associate in the Department of Anthropology, Stanford University, was formerly a Research Associate for Columbia University Research in Contemporary Cultures. He is engaged in work on problems of human communication, especially in schizophrenics.

LEONARD BINDER is an Instructor in the Department of Political Science, University of California at Los Angeles. He is currently preparing his doctoral dissertation, "Islamic Constitutional Theory and Politics in Pakistan" (Harvard, 1956), for publication.

ROBERT E. LANE, Associate Professor of Political Science at Yale University, is the author of *The Regulation of Businessmen* (1954), *Problems of American Government* (2nd ed., 1957), and *Political Life: Why People Get Involved in Politics* (to be published in June 1958).

LEO LOWENTHAL, the first (and last) Director of the Evaluation Staff of the Voice of America, is now Professor of Sociology and Professor of Speech at the University of California in Berkeley. Among his publications are *Prophets of Deceit* (1949) and *Literature and the Image of Man* (1957).

ROBERT E. WARD, Associate Professor of Political Science and a staff member of the Center for Japanese Studies at the University of Michigan, is a specialist in the political affairs of Eastern Asia. He is co-author, with Richard K. Beardsley and John W. Hall, of a forthcoming book, Village Japan.

MARION J. LEVY, JR., Associate Professor of Sociology, Princeton University, is engaged in a comparative analysis of Japan of the Tokugawa period and of the 1920's and 1930's. His publications include *The Family Revolution in Modern China* (1949) and *The Structure of Society* (1952).

MALCOLM W. Hoad, a member of the staff of The RAND Corporation, was Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Illinois in 1948-1950 and subsequently served as an economist with the Marshall Plan Mission to the United Kingdom.

MARTIN L. KILSON, JR., a Ph.D. Candidate and Teaching Fellow in Government at Harvard University, holds a fellowship from the John Hay Whitney Foundation for 1957-1958. He is writing a doctoral dissertation on "The United Nations Visiting Missions to Trust Territories."
