The entire text, including footnotes and headings, of manuscripts submitted for publication must be prepared in double-spaced typescript with generous margins to allow for copyediting. Manuscripts should be submitted in two copies. Footnotes must be numbered consecutively and should be placed in a separate section at the end of the text. It would be very helpful if authors would supply a computer disk with the article, in ASCII text format (MS-DOS) or Word Perfect, on either 3 1/2" or 5 1/4" double-sided diskettes.

Further guidelines for the preparation of manuscripts for publication in *Central European History* will be sent upon acceptance of materials by the editor. All materials will be edited to conform with *The Chicago Manual of Style* in matters regarding punctuation, capitalization, and format. The final decision on style remains with the editor.
