ASIC TEXTBOOKS of philosophy tend to be of two kinds: either collected and edited readings from classical sources, or else elementary introductions. In this book Antony Flew has combined and integrated these two methods, interspersing his own admirably clear and fair-minded text with readings from the classical philosophers whenever they seemed to have something especially good to say.
