- SHINICHI ICHIMURA is Professor of Economics and Director of The Center for Southeast Asian Studies. He is a graduate of Kyoto University and has a Ph.D from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has published in Japanese, *The Structure of the Japanese Economy* (Tokyo, 1958) and *Economic Power on Trial* (Tokyo, 1970). His research interest is economic development and planning.
- YONEO ISHII is Professor of Southeast Asian History. His major work in Japanese is *A Political Sociology of Theravada Buddhism in Thailand* (Tokyo, 1975). He compiled in conjunction with two other Japanese scholars, *A Glossorial Index of the Sukhothai Inscriptions* (Kyoto, 1972). His research interest is the comparative study of Theravada Buddhism in Southeast Asia. He has been on study leave, recently, at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London.
- KOICHI MIZUNO is Professor of Anthropology. He obtained his Ph.D at Kyoto University. He has an article in *Asian Survey* Vol. 8, No. 10 (1968) and has contributed to J. Fisher (ed.) *Foreign Values and Southeast Asian Scholarship.* He is presently studying the impact of industrialization on rural communities in Southeast Asia.
- YOSHIHIRO TSUBOUCHI is also Associate Professor of Anthropology with a Ph.D conferred by Kyoto University. He has two published studies in Japanese, *Divorce — A Cross-Cultural Study of Marital Stability* (Tokyo, 1970) and (as co-author) *A Study of Malay Peasant Villages* (Tokyo, 1975). His current work is on urban life in Indonesia.
- MITSUO EZAKI, a Research Associate, is an economist. He holds a Ph.D from Harvard University. He and a co-author, D. W. Jorgenson, wrote a section of a book *Economic Growth*, Ohkawa and Hayami (eds.) (Japan Economic Research Center, Tokyo, 1973). His field is econometrics and economic development.
- KENJI TSUCHIYA is a Research Associate. After obtaining an M.A. degree at Tokyo University in 1968, he went to Gadjah Mada University and studied there till 1970. He has an article in *Pusara* Vol. 40, No. 7 (1970), Yogyakarta, and another in *Southeast Asian Studies* Vol. 9, No. 1, Kyoto University. He is presently doing research on Indonesian political history before independence.
- NARIFUMI MAEDA, Associate Professor in Anthropology, has a Ph.D from the University of Chicago. He is the co-author of a book in Japanese, *A Study* of Malay Peasant Villages (Tokyo, 1975). He is interested in symbology, and is engaged in a cultural-anthropological study of symbolism among the Buginese in Indonesia.
- YOSHIKAZU TAKAYA is Professor of Geography. He obtained his Ph.D at Kyoto University. He has a chapter to his credit, entitled "Physiographic Model of Riceland in the Chao Phraya Basin", in Shinichi Ichimura (ed.), *The Nature, Society and Economy of Southeast Asia* (Tokyo, 1974). He has also published numerous articles on the geomorphology of Southeast Asian countries, particularly in connection with rice-growing and irrigation.
