Manuscripts submitted to CEH should not be under consideration by another journal pending decision of the editor on publication. If it is learned that an article is under submission to another journal while being considered at CEH, consideration will cease immediately. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.

The editors prefer that manuscripts be submitted in electronic form as e-mail attachments sent to the journal's address, preferably in Microsoft Word 2003 or later or WordPerfect 12.0 or later; Adobe Acrobat pdf files will also be reviewed. Manuscripts submitted in printed form must be accompanied by a compact disk or diskette with the article in Word, WordPerfect, or pdf. The entire text of all manuscripts, including footnotes and headings, must be prepared in double-spaced typescript with generous margins to allow for copyediting. Footnotes must be numbered consecutively and should be placed in a separate section at the end of the text.
