The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholars in Health Policy Research Program

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation selects up to 12 highly qualified social scientists each year to participate in the **Scholars in Health Policy Research Program**, a national program that provides talented individuals with two-year fellowships at one of three nationally prominent academic institutions—the University of California at Berkeley, The University of Michigan, and Yale University. While in the program, the Scholars have the opportunity to

work closely with faculty from the social sciences as well as from medicine, public health, public policy, management, and law, in an environment conducive to multidisciplinary learning and collaborative research. 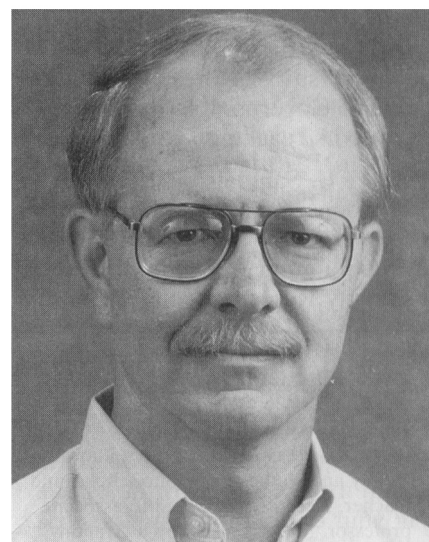

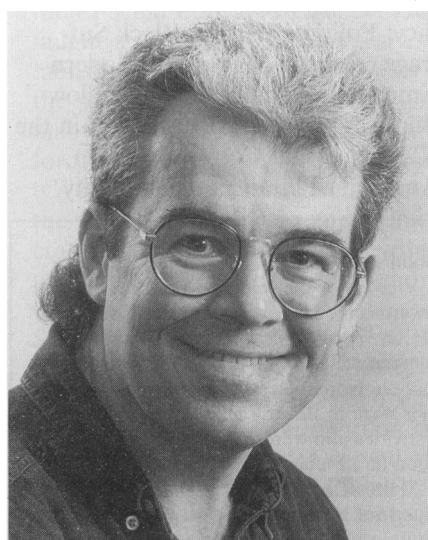
Samuel B. Hoff, professor of history and political science, Delaware State University, was awarded the University Employee of the Year Award for Excellence in Teaching.

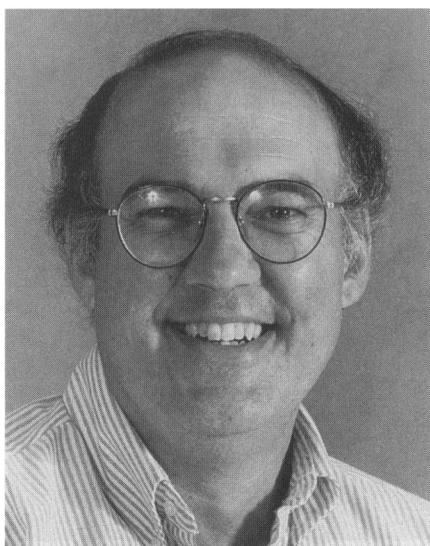

Political Scientist Wins Grammy Award

John Maltese of the University of Georgia Political Science Department is known to faculty and students as a fine scholar and teacher. Recently promoted to associate professor, Maltese also won a Grammy Award in 1996. Maltese and his 76-year old father joined the ranks of Emmylou Harris, Stevie Wonder, and Alanis Morissette, all winners in the 38th annual Grammy Awards. As the co-author of the program notes for the "The Heifetz Col-

lection," a 65-CD set of the complete recordings made by Jascha Heifetz from 1917-1972, Maltese was honored for his contributions to this year's "Best Historical Album." The notes for this set of approximately 75 hours of music were not the more typical pamphlet but an illustrated paperback book. Some of the book's illustrations came from the Maltese's collection of Heifetz's recordings and memorabilia, a collection that includes every version of every recording made by the legendary

violinist.

Viewers of the televised Grammy Awards ceremony would not have seen Maltese receive his award as most recipients receive their prizes in an afternoon session. Nonetheless, Maltese and his father were in Beverly Hills for the entire festivities and were present for both afternoon and evening ceremonies.

Maltese learned that he had been nominated for a Grammy Award rather serendipitously while conducting a Web search for a review of his most recent book *The Selling of Supreme Court Nominees* (published by the Johns Hopkins Press). Maltese didn't find the book review but he did notice a *Los Angeles Times* article that included a list of all of the 1996 Grammy Award nominees. Happily, he discovered his name.

Maltese has a record in political science that is equal to his accomplishments in music. His book, *Spin Control* (published by the University of North Carolina Press) won a Frank Luther Mott Award and has recently been issued in a 2nd edition. Currently, Maltese is working on a book-length treatment of Justice David Souter. In addition to this scholarship, Maltese has studied and written about music since the age of 12. He also attended Heifetz's last concert in 1972. Maltese's colleagues at Georgia can't be certain that he is the only political scientist to ever win a Grammy but are certain that there are few who match his distinguished accomplishments in two disparate fields of study.
