On subparacompact and countably subparacompact spaces

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A space is said to be subparacompact if every open covering of it has a σ -discrete closed refinement. Subparacompactness is equivalent to F_{σ} -screenability of McAuley and also to σ -paracompactness of Arhangel'skiĭ. Some properties of these spaces have been obtained in this note. Countably subparacompact spaces, which can be defined in an analogous manner, have also been studied.

In [12] McAuley has introduced the concept of F_{σ} -screenability. He calls a space X, F_{σ} -screenable if every open covering of X has a σ -discrete closed refinement. Obviously every regular paracompact space is F_{σ} -screenable. Bing [2] has given an example (Example H, [2]) to show that there exists a normal F_{σ} -screenable space which is not paracompact. However, as proved by McAuley [12], in a collectionwise normal space F_{σ} -screenability implies paracompactness. Again in [1], Arhangel'skiĭ introduced the notion of σ -paracompactness. According to him, a space X is σ -paracompact if it has the property that 'for every open covering U of X there exists a sequence $\{u_n\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ of open coverings of X such that for each $x \in X$ there exists a positive integer m(x) and a $U \in U$ such that $St(x, u_{m(x)}) \subset U$ ', where $St(x, u_{m(x)})$ denotes the union of all those members of $U_m(x)$ which contain x. Burke and Stoltenberg [5] and

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Čoban [6] proved simultaneously, but independently, that F_{σ} -screenability implies σ -paracompactness. But, later on, Burke [3] proved that F_{σ} -screenability and σ -paracompactness are actually equivalent. He further proved that any of these properties of a space X is equivalent to any of the following two properties of X:

- every open covering of X has a σ-locally finite closed refinement;
- (2) every open covering of X has a σ-closure preserving closed refinement.

A space characterized by any of the above four properties is called by Burke [3] a subparacompact space. Subparacompactness has also been studied recently by Hodel [9]. In the present note we present some further results on subparacompact spaces. In Section 1, some results concerning subparacompact subsets are obtained. Section 2 deals with some sum theorems. In Section 3 countably subparacompact spaces have been studied.

1. Subsets and subparacompactness

As with the other compactness properties, it can easily be verified that every closed subset of a subparacompact space is subparacompact. In fact, the following stronger result can be proved.

THEOREM 1.1. Every F_{σ} -subset (that is, a countable union of closed subsets) of a subparacompact space is subparacompact.

Proof. Let X be a subparacompact space and let A be an F_{σ} -subset of X. Let $U = \{U_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ be an open (in A) covering of A. Let $U_{\alpha} = A \cap U'_{\alpha}$ for each $\alpha \in \Lambda$, where U'_{α} is open in X. Since A is an F_{σ} -subset, there exist closed subsets A_i of X such that $A = \bigcup_{i=1}^{\infty} A_i$. Now, for each i, let W_i be an open covering of X whose elements are $Y \sim A_i$ and all U'_{α} 's. Since X is subparacompact, W_i has a σ -locally finite closed refinement $V_i = \bigcup_{j=1}^{\infty} V_j^j$. Let U_i^j be the collection of all those elements of V_i^j which intersect A_i . Each U_i^j is locally finite with respect to X. $\overset{\infty}{\bigcup} U_i^j$ is an open covering of A_i such that every element of U_i^j is contained in some U_{α}' . Let $U_i^{*j} = \left\{ B \cap A : B \in U_i^j \right\}$ and let $U^* = \overset{\infty}{\bigcup} \overset{\infty}{\bigcup} U_i^{*j}$. Then U^* is a σ -locally finite (in A) i=1 j=1

closed (in A) refinement of U . Hence A is subparacompact.

DEFINITION 1.1. A subset A of a topological space X is said to be a generalized F_{σ} -subset if for each open subset U of X containing A there exists an F_{σ} -subset B of X which is contained in U and contains A.

THEOREM 1.2. Every generalized F_{σ} -subset of a subparacompact space is subparacompact.

Theorem 1.2 will easily follow from Theorem 1.1 and the following

THEOREM 1.3. Let X be a topological space and let A be a subset of X such that every open subset of X which contains A contains a subparacompact set which contains A. Then A is subparacompact.

Proof. Let $U = \{U_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ be an open (in A) covering of A. For each α , let $U_{\alpha} = A \cap V_{\alpha}$ where V_{α} is open in X. Then $A \subset \bigcup V_{\alpha}$. By the given condition there exists a subparacompact subset B of X such that $A' \subset B \subset \bigcup V_{\alpha}$. Now $\{V_{\alpha} \cap B : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ is an open $\alpha \in \Lambda$ $\alpha \in \Lambda$ is a σ -locally finite (in B) closed (in B) refinement $W = \bigcup_{i=1}^{\infty} W_i$. Let $W_i = \{W_{ij} : j \in \Lambda_i\}$. If $W_{ij} = V_{ij} \cap B$, where V_{ij} is closed in X, then $V_{ij} \cap A$ is closed in A. Also the family $V_i = \{V_{ij} \cap A : j \in \Lambda_i\}$ is locally finite in A for each i, and $\sum_{i=1}^{\infty} V_i$ covers A. Hence A is subparacompact. THEOREM 1.4. If every open subset of a subparacompact space X is subparacompact, then every subset of X is subparacompact.

Proof. Let A be a subset of X and let U be an open (in A) covering of A. Then there is a collection U^* of open subsets of X such that $U = \{U^* \cap A : U^* \in U^*\}$. Let $G = \cup\{U^* : U^* \in U^*\}$. Then G is an open subset of X and U^* is an open covering of G. Thus there is a sequence $\{U_n^*\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ of open (in G and hence in X) coverings of G such that for each $x \in G$ there is a positive integer m(x) and $U^* \in U^*$ such that $St(x, U_{m(x)}^*) \subset U^*$. For each n, let

$$\begin{split} & \mathcal{U}_n = \{ \mathcal{U}^* \cap A : \mathcal{U}^* \in \mathcal{U}_n^* \} \text{ . Then } \{ \mathcal{U}_n \}_{n=1}^{\infty} \text{ is a sequence of open (in } A \text{)} \\ & \text{coverings of } A \text{ satisfying the condition for subparacompactness of } A \text{ .} \end{split}$$

2. Sum theorems

DEFINITION 2.1. (Katuta, [10]). A family $\{A_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ of subsets of X is said to be order locally finite if there is a linear ordering '<' of the index set Λ such that for each $\alpha \in \Lambda$, the family $\{A_{\alpha} : \beta < \alpha\}$ is locally finite at each point of A_{α} .

Every σ -locally finite family is order locally finite, but not conversely.

In [13], Singal and Arya have proved that for a topological property P which is weakly hereditary (that is, a property which when possessed by a space is also possessed by every closed subset of it) and for which the locally finite sum theorem holds (that is, if $\{F_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ is a locally finite closed covering of X such that each F_{α} has the property P, then X has the property P), the following results are true:

THEOREM 2.1. Let V be an order locally finite open covering of a space X such that the closure of each member of V possesses the property P. Then X possesses P.

THEOREM 2.2. If X is a regular space, if V is an order locally finite open covering of X each member of which possesses the property P and if the frontier of each member of V is compact, then X possesses

the property P.

We shall prove that the locally finite sum theorem holds for subparacompactness.

THEOREM 2.3. If $\{F_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ is a locally finite closed covering of a space X such that each F_{α} is subparacompact, then X is subparacompact.

Proof. Let $\mathcal{U} = \{\mathcal{U}_{\beta} : \beta \in \Delta\}$ be an open covering of X. Then $\{\mathcal{U}_{\beta} \cap F_{\alpha} : \beta \in \Delta\}$ is an open covering of F_{α} for each α . Since F_{α} is subparacompact, therefore there exists a family $\mathcal{V}^{\alpha} = \bigcup_{i=1}^{\infty} \mathcal{V}_{i}^{\alpha}$ of closed subsets of F_{α} (and hence of X) such that each \mathcal{V}_{i}^{α} is a discrete (in F_{α} and hence in X) family of subsets of F_{α} such that \mathcal{V}^{α} is a covering of F_{α} . For each i, let $\mathcal{U}_{i} = \bigcup_{\alpha \in \Lambda} \mathcal{V}_{i}^{\alpha}$ and let $\mathcal{U} = \bigcup_{i=1}^{\infty} \mathcal{U}_{i}$. Then \mathcal{U} is a closed covering of X which is a refinement of \mathcal{U} . Also, we shall show that each \mathcal{U}_{i} is locally finite. Let $x \in X$. Since $\{F_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ is locally finite, there exists an open set M_{x} such that $M_{x} \cap F_{\alpha} = \emptyset$ for all except finitely many indices α , say $\alpha_{1}, \alpha_{2}, \dots, \alpha_{n}$. We can assume that $x \in F_{\alpha}$, for each

i = 1, 2, ..., n. Since each one of the collections $V_j^{\alpha_1}, V_j^{\alpha_2}, ..., V_j^{\alpha_n}$ is discrete, therefore, for each i = 1, 2, ..., n there exists an open set W_i such that $x \in W_i$ and W_i intersects at most one member of $V_j^{\alpha_i}$. Thus $x \in W_1 \cap ... \cap W_n \cap M_x$ which is a neighbourhood of x which intersects only finitely many members of W_i and hence W_i is locally finite. Thus W is a σ -locally finite closed refinement of U and hence X is subparacompact.

COROLLARY 2.1. A disjoint topological sum of subparacompact spaces

is subparacompact.

Since subparacompactness is weakly hereditary, it follows in view of Theorem 2.3 above that Theorems 2.1 and 2.2 are true for P = subparacompact. Thus we have the following results.

THEOREM 2.4. If V is an order locally finite open covering of X such that the closure of each member of V is subparacompact, then X is subparacompact.

THEOREM 2.5. Let X be a regular space and V be an order locally finite open covering of X such that each member of V is subparacompact and the frontier of each member of V is compact. Then X is subparacompact.

Since every σ -locally finite family is order locally finite, we have the following important results as corollaries to Theorems 2.4 and 2.5.

COROLLARY 2.2. Let V be a σ -locally finite open covering of a space X such that the closure of each member of V is subparacompact. Then X is subparacompact.

COROLLARY 2.3. Let X be a regular topological space and let V be a σ -locally finite open covering of X such that each member of V is subparacompact and the frontier of each member of V is compact. Then X is subparacompact.

DEFINITION 2.2. [Hodel, δ]. A subset A of a space is said to be elementary if it is open and if there exists a sequence $\{A_i\}_{i=1}^{\infty}$ of open subsets of X such that $A \subset \bigcup_{i=1}^{\infty} A_i$ and $\overline{A_i} \subset A$ for all i. A covering

of X consisting of elementary sets is said to be an elementary covering.

As a result of Theorem 2.3 and the weak hereditary character of subparacompactness, we have the following;

THEOREM 2.6. If V is a σ -locally finite elementary covering of X such that each element of V is subparacompact, then X is subparacompact.

THEOREM 2.7. Let V be a locally finite open covering of a regular space X such that each member of V is subparacompact and the frontier

of each member of V is Lindelöf. Then X is subparacompact.

Proof. Let $V = \{V_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ be the given locally finite open covering of X . For each $\alpha \in \Lambda$, $\operatorname{FrV}_{\alpha}$ is Lindelöf. Therefore there exists a countable subfamily $\left\{ V_{\alpha} : i = 1, 2, \ldots \right\}$ of V which covers $\operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha}$. Let $F_{1} = \operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha} \sim \bigcup_{i=2}^{\infty} V_{\alpha}$, so that F_{1} is a closed subset of $\operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha}$ and hence of X such that $F_1 \subset V_{\alpha_1}$. We shall prove that there exists an open set U_1 such that $F_1 \subset U_1 \subset \overline{U}_1 \subset V_{\alpha_1}$. Since X is regular, for each $x \in F_1$ there is an open set U_x such that $x \in U_x \subset \overline{U}_x \subset V_{\alpha_1}$. Since F_1 is Lindelöf, the open covering $\{U_x : x \in F_1\}$ of F_1 has a countable subcovering, say U'_1, U'_2, \ldots , such that for each $n \in \mathbb{N}$, $\overline{U}'_{n} \cap \left(X \sim V_{\alpha_{1}} \right) = \emptyset \quad \text{Now} \quad X \sim V_{\alpha_{1}} = \left(X \sim \overline{V}_{\alpha_{1}} \right) \cup \left(\operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha_{1}} \right) \quad \text{and}$ $\operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha_1} \cap F_1 = \emptyset$, since V_{α_1} is open and $F_1 \subset V_{\alpha_1}$. Let $y \in X \sim V_{\alpha_1}$. If $y \in FrV_{\alpha_{-}}$ then again by regularity of X there exists an open set V_{y} such that $y \in V_y \subset \overline{V}_y \subset X \sim F_1$. If $y \in X \sim \overline{V}_{\alpha_1}$, then $X \sim \overline{V}_{\alpha_2}$ is an open set containing y such that $\overline{X} \sim \overline{V}_{\alpha_1} \cap F_1 = \emptyset$; for if $z \in F_1$ then V_{α_1} is an open set containing z such that $V_{\alpha_1} \cap \left(X \circ \overline{V}_{\alpha_1} \right) = \emptyset$, which implies $z \notin X \sim \overline{V}_{\alpha_1}$. Since FrV_{α_1} is Lindelöf the covering $\left\{ X \sim \overline{V}_{\alpha_1}, V_y : y \in FrV_{\alpha_1} \right\}$ of $X \sim V_{\alpha_1}$ has a countable subcovering, say V'_1, V'_2, \ldots , which covers $X \sim V_{\alpha_1}$ and such that for each $n \in N$, $\overline{V}'_n \cap F_1 = \emptyset$. For each $n \in N$, let $U_n'' = U_n' \sim \cup \{\overline{V}_p' : p \le n\}$

and

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$$V''_n = V'_n \lor \cup \{\overline{U}'_p : p \le n\}$$

Then $U_n'' \cap V_m'' = \psi$ for all $n, m \in \mathbb{N}$. Let $U_1 = \bigcup_{n=1}^{\infty} U_n'', V_1 = \bigcup_{n=1}^{\infty} V_n''$ so that $F_1 \subset U_1$ and $X \sim V_{\alpha_1} \subset V_1$. Hence $F_1 \subset U_1 \subset \overline{U}_1 \subset X \sim V_1 \subset V_{\alpha_1}$. \overline{U}_1 , being a closed subset of V_{α_1} , is subparacompact.

Now suppose that for each i = 1, 2, ..., n-1, there exists an open set U_i such that $F_i \subset U_i \subset \overline{U}_i \subset V_{\alpha_i}$ where

$$F_{i} = \operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha} \sim \left[\begin{pmatrix} i-1 \\ \cup \\ k=1 \end{pmatrix} \cup \begin{pmatrix} \infty \\ \cup \\ k=i+1 \end{pmatrix} \right]$$

and \overline{U}_i is subparacompact. We shall now construct U_n and F_n as follows. Let $F_n = \operatorname{Fr} V_\alpha \sim \left[\begin{pmatrix} n-1 \\ \cup \\ k=1 \end{pmatrix} U_k \right] \cup \begin{pmatrix} \infty \\ \cup \\ k=n+1 \end{pmatrix} V_{\alpha_k} \right]$. Then $F_n \subset V_{\alpha_n}$, for if $x \in F_n$ then $x \in \bigcup_{k=1}^{\infty} V_{\alpha_k}$, $x \notin \bigcup_{k=1}^{n-1} U_k$, $x \notin \bigcup_{k=n+1} V_k$. $x \notin U_{n-1}$ implies that $x \notin F_{n-1} = \operatorname{Fr} V_\alpha \sim \left[\begin{pmatrix} n-2 \\ \cup \\ k=1 \end{pmatrix} U_k \right] \cup \begin{pmatrix} \infty \\ \cup \\ k=n \end{pmatrix} V_{\alpha_k} \right]$. Therefore

 $x \in \bigcup_{k=n}^{V} V_{\alpha_k}$ and thus $x \in V_{\alpha_n}$. As before, therefore, there exists an open set U_n such that $F_n \subset U_n \subset \overline{U}_n \subset V_{\alpha_n}$ and \overline{U}_n is subparacompact. The proof is complete by induction and we can define a family $U = \{U_n : n = 1, 2, ...\}$ of open sets satisfying

(a) U is a covering of FrV_{α} ;

(b) $\{\overline{U}_n : n = 1, 2, \ldots\}$ is locally finite.

To prove (a), let $x \in \operatorname{Fr} V_{\alpha}$. Since $\left\{ V_{\alpha_i} : i = 1, 2, \ldots \right\}$ is point finite, we can take the largest integer i such that $x \in V_{\alpha_i}$. Then

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Let
$$F_0 = \overline{V}_{\alpha} \sim \bigcup_{k=1}^{\infty} U_k$$
; then $\{\overline{U}_n : n = 1, 2, ...\} \cup \{F_0\}$ is a locally finite closed covering of \overline{V}_{α} each member of which is subparacompact. Hence \overline{V}_{α} is subparacompact. Thus $\{\overline{V}_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ is a locally finite closed covering of X each member of which is subparacompact. Hence X is subparacompact in view of Theorem 2.3.

DEFINITION 2.3. (Dowker [7]). A space X is said to be totally normal if it is normal and if every open subset G of X is expressible as a union of a locally finite (in G) family of open F_{α} -subsets of X.

It is proved in [7] that every subset of a totally normal space is totally normal.

THEOREM 2.8. Every subset of a totally normal subparacompact space is subparacompact.

Proof. In view of Theorem 1.4 we prove only that every open subset of a totally normal subparacompact space is subparacompact. Let G be an open subset of X. Then $G = \bigcup_{\alpha \in \Lambda} G_{\alpha}$ where $\{G_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ is locally finite in G and each G_{α} is an open F_{σ} -subset of X. Now G is totally normal and hence normal. Therefore there exists a locally finite open refinement $\{H_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ of $\{G_{\alpha} : \alpha \in \Lambda\}$ such that $\overline{H}^{G}_{\alpha} \subset G_{\alpha}$ for each $\alpha \in \Lambda$, where $\overline{H}^{G}_{\alpha}$ denotes the closure of H_{α} in G. It can easily be seen that $\overline{H}^{G}_{\alpha}$ is an F_{σ} -subset of X. Therefore, by Theorem 2.3, it follows that G is subparacompact. Hence the theorem.

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3. Countably subparacompact spaces

A space X is said to be countably subparacompact if every countable open covering of X has a σ -discrete closed refinement.

This definition is due to HodeI [9]. It is proved essentially in [11] that in a normal space countable subparacompactness, countable paracompactness and countable metacompactness are all equivalent. Also, in a screenable space (that is, a space in which every open covering has a σ -mutually disjoint open refinement) countable subparacompactness is equivalent to subparacompactness (*cf.* HodeI [9]). It can easily be verified that a space is countably subparacompact if and only if it satisfies the condition:

given a countable open covering { $U_n : n = 1, 2, ...$ } of X, there is a countable closed covering { $F_{nj} : n = 1, 2, ...; j = 1, 2, ...$ } of X with $F_{nj} \subset U_n$ for all n and all j.

In the present section we obtain some more characterizations of countable subparacompactness, and we find that if we add the word 'countable' with the open coverings in the equivalences for subparacompactness obtained by Burke [3] (mentioned in the introduction) we obtain the equivalences for countable subparacompactness [Theorem 3.1]. Throughout, N will be used to denote the set of all natural numbers.

THEOREM 3.1. For a topological space X the following are equivalent:-

- (i) every countable open covering of X has a G-discrete closed refinement;
- (ii) every countable open covering of X has a σ -locally finite closed refinement;
- (iii) every countable open covering of X has a G-closure preserving closed refinement.

Before proving this theorem we prove the following lemma.

LEMMA 3.1. Let every countable open covering of X have a closure preserving closed refinement. Then for every sequence $\{U(n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$

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of countable open coverings of X, where $U(n) = \{U_i(n) : i \in N\}$ and $U_i(n+1) \subset U_i(n)$ for all $i \in N$, there exists a sequence $\{V(n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ of closed coverings of X such that for each $n \in N$, $V(n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} V_m(n)$ and the following are satisfied:-

(1) $V_m(n) = \{V_{i,m}(n) : i \in N\}$ and $V_m(n)$ is closure preserving for each $m \in N$;

(2)
$$V_{i,m}(n) \subset U_i(n)$$
, for all i and $m \in N$;

- (3) $V_{i,m}(n) \subset V_{i,m+1}(n)$, for all i and $m \in N$;
- (4) $V_{i,m}(n+1) \subset V_{i,m}(n)$, for all i and $m \in \mathbb{N}$.

Proof of the lemma. Let $n \in N$. Let $P(n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} P_m(n)$ be a σ -closure preserving closed refinement of U(n). We now construct another σ -closure preserving closed refinement, $W(n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} W_m(n)$ of U(n) as

follows: Let $\mathcal{W}_m(n) = \bigcup_{i \leq m} \mathcal{P}_i(n)$. Then $\mathcal{W}(n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} \mathcal{W}_m(n)$ is a σ -closure preserving closed refinement of $\mathcal{U}(n)$ such that $\mathcal{W}_m(n) \subset \mathcal{W}_{m+1}(n)$. Now, let $i, m, n \in \mathbb{N}$. If m < n, let $V_{i,m}(n) = \mathcal{G}$. If $m \geq n$, define

$$V_{i,m}(n) = \bigcup \{ W \in W_m(k) : W \subset U_i(n), k \in \mathbb{N}, n \le k \le m \}$$

Each $V_{i...m}(n)$, being a finite union of closed sets, is closed. Let

$$V_m(n) = \{V_{i,m}(n) : i \in \mathbb{N}\} \text{ . Let } V(n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} V_m(n) \text{ . Then } \{V(n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty} \text{ is}$$

the required sequence of closed coverings.

Proof of Theorem 3.1. $(i) \Rightarrow (ii)$ and $(ii) \Rightarrow (iii)$ are obvious. Therefore we prove that $(iii) \Rightarrow (i)$. Let $U = \{U_i : i \in N\}$ be a countable open covering of X. We shall construct a σ -discrete closed refinement of U. For each $n \in N$, let $U_i(1, n) = U_i$. Then $\{U(1, n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$, where $U(1, n) = \{U_i(1, n) : i \in N\}$ is a sequence of countable open coverings of X. Thus, by the above lemma there exists a sequence $\{V(1, n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ of countable closed coverings of X such that for each $n \in N$, the following are satisfied:

(i)
$$V(1, n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} V_m(1, n)$$
;

- (ii) $V_m(1, n) = \{V_{i,m}(1, n) : i \in N\}$ and is closure preserving for each $m \in N$;
- (iii) $V_{i,m}(1, n) \subset U_i(1, n)$, for all i and $m \in N$; (iv) $V_{i,m}(1, n) \subset V_{i,m+1}(1, n)$, for all i and $m \in N$; (v) $V_{i,m}(1, n+1) \subset V_{i,m}(1, n)$, for all i and $m \in N$.

By induction, therefore, it follows that for each $k \in N$, we can construct a sequence $\{V(k, n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ of countable closed coverings of X and a sequence of countable open coverings $\{U(k, n)\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ such that for each $n \in N$, the following are satisfied:-

- (1) $V(k, n) = \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} V_m(k, n)$;
- (2) $V_m(k, n) = \{V_{i,m}(k, n) : i \in N\}$ and is closure preserving for each $m \in N$;

(3)
$$V_{i,m}(k, n) \subset U_i(k, n)$$
, for each i and $m \in N$;

(4) $V_{i,m}(k, n) \subset V_{i,m+1}(k, n)$, for each i and $m \in \mathbb{N}$;

(5)
$$V_{i,m}(k, n+1) \subset V_{i,m}(k, n)$$
, for each i and $m \in \mathbb{N}$;

(6)
$$U_i(k+1, n) = U_i \sim \bigcup_{j \le i} V_{j,n}(k, 1)$$
.

Each U(k, n) is an open covering of X, for if $x \in X$ and U_i is

the first member of U containing x , then $x \in U_i(k, n)$ for any $k, n \in \mathbb{N}$. For $i, m, n, k \in \mathbb{N}$, define

$$W_i(k, m, n) = V_{i,m}(k, 1) \cap V_{i,m}(k+1, n)$$
.

Then $W(k, m, n) = \{W_i(k, m, n) : i \in N\}$ is a closure preserving collection of closed sets. Let $i, i' \in N$ with $i' \neq i$. Let i' < i, then

$$W_{i}(k, m, n) \subset V_{i,m}(k+1, n) \subset U_{i}(k+1, n)$$

$$= U_{i} \sim \bigcup V_{j,n}(k, 1)$$

$$\subset U_{i} \sim V_{i',n}(k, 1) , \text{ since } i' < i$$

$$\subset U_{i} \sim W_{i'}(k, m, n) .$$

Hence $W_{i'}(k, m, n) \cap W_{i}(k, m, n) = \emptyset$ for all $i, i' \in N$ with $i \neq i'$. Thus $W_{i'}(k, m, n)$, being a family of mutually disjoint closed sets, is discrete for each $k, m, n \in N$. Also $W_{i}(k, m, n) \subset U_{i}$. To prove that $W = \bigcup \cup \bigcup \bigcup W(k, m, n)$ is a covering of X, let $x \in X$. Then there k=1 m=1 n=1exists a $j \in N$ and $k \in N$ such that $x \in U_{j}(k, m)$ and $x \notin U_{i}(k, m)$ for i < j. Since V(k, m) is a covering of X, there is an $n \in N$ such that $x \in V \in V_{n}(k, m)$. Then there is an $i \in N$ such that $x \in V_{i,n}(k, m)$ and $x \notin V_{i',n'}(k', m')$ for i' < i. We show that $x \in W_{i}(k, m, n)$. We notice that if i' < i,

$$V_{i',m}^{(k+1, n)} \subset U_{i'}^{(k+1, n)}$$

 $\subset U_{i'}^{(k+1, n)} \setminus V_{i,n}^{(k, 1)},$

and so,

$$V_{i',m}(k+1, n) \cap V_{i,n}(k, 1) = \emptyset$$
.

Thus

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$$x \in V_{i,n}(k, m) \sim \bigcup_{i' < i} V_{i',m}(k+1, n)$$

$$\subset V_{i,n}(k, 1) \sim \bigcup_{i' < i} V_{i',m}(k+1, n)$$

$$= V_{i,n}(k, 1) \sim \bigcup_{i' \neq i} V_{i',m}(k+1, n) , \text{ in virtue of (3) and (6)}$$

$$\subset V_{i,n}(k, 1) \cap V_{i,m}(k+1, n) = W_{i}(k, m, n) .$$

Hence W is a σ -discrete closed refinement of U; which proves $(iii) \Rightarrow (i)$.

THEOREM 3.2. A closed continuous image of a countably subparacompact space is countably subparacompact.

Proof. Let f: X + Y be a closed continuous mapping from a countably subparacompact space X to a space Y. Let $U = \{U_i : i \in N\}$ be a countable open cover of Y. By continuity of f, $f^{-1}(U) = \{f^{-1}(U_i) : i \in N\}$ is a countable open cover of X. Therefore there exists a closed refinement $P = \bigcup_{n=1}^{\infty} P_n$ of $f^{-1}(U)$ where each P_n is a closure preserving collection of closed sets. Since f is a closed mapping, $f(P_n) = \{f(P) : P \in P_n\}$ is a closure preserving collection of closed sets. Hence Y is countably subparacompact.

THEOREM 3.3. If $f: X \to Y$ is a closed, continuous mapping from a regular space X onto a countably subparacompact space Y such that $f^{-1}(y)$ is compact for each $y \in Y$, then X is countably subparacompact. Proof. Suppose $U = \{U_i : i \in N\}$ is an open cover of X. For each $y \in Y$, we can find a finite subcollection $U(y) \subset U$ such that

 $f^{-1}(y) \subset U(y) = \bigcup \{U : U \in U(y)\}$. Let $V(y) = Y \sim f(X \sim U(y))$. Then $V = \{V(y) : y \in Y\}$ is an open cover of Y. Since U is countable and $\{U(y) : y \in Y\} \subset \{W : W \text{ is a finite subcollection of } U\}$ we see that $\{U(y) : y \in Y\}$ is countable. Then $\{U(y) : y \in Y\}$ and hence V is countable. Thus, by countable subparacompactness of Y, V has a $\sigma\text{-discrete closed refinement } V^* = \bigcup_{n=1}^{\infty} V_n^* \text{. Clearly} \\ f^{-1}(V^*) = \{f^{-1}(V^*) : V^* \in V^*\} \text{ is a } \sigma\text{-discrete refinement of } \{U(y) : y \in Y\} \text{. Given } V^* \in V^* \text{, let } y(V^*) \text{ be a fixed element of } Y \text{ such that } f^{-1}(V^*) \subset U(y(V^*)) \text{ . For each } n \in N \text{ , let } U_n^* = \left\{f^{-1}(V^*) \cap U : V^* \in V_n^*, U \in U(y(V^*))\right\} \text{ . Since } f^{-1}(V_n^*) \text{ is a discrete collection in } X \text{ , each } x \in X \text{ has a neighbourhood } N_x \text{ which intersects at most one element of } f^{-1}(V_n^*) \text{ . Since each element of } f^{-1}(V_n^*) \text{ intersects only finitely many elements of } U_n^* \text{ and each element of } U_n^* \text{ is contained in some element of } f^{-1}(V_n^*) \text{ it follows that } N_x \text{ will intersect only finitely many elements of } U_n^* \text{ is locally finite and } \pi$

 $U^* = \bigcup_{n \to \infty} U^*$ is a σ -locally finite refinement of U. Since X is n=1regular, it follows that every countable open cover of X has a σ -locally finite closed refinement. Hence X is countably subparacompact.

REMARKS. It is easy to see that the results of Theorems 1.1, 1.2, 1.3, 1.4, 2.3, 2.4, 2.5, 2.6, 2.7, 2.8 and Corollaries 2.1, 2.2, 2.3 in Sections 1 and 2 remain true if 'subparacompact' is replaced by 'countably subparacompact'.

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
