The Journal is published in November, February, May and August, and the annual Bibliography of Asian Studies, formerly known as the Far Eastern Bibliography, is published as a fifth number of the Journal in September. Subscription for the five numbers is \$10.00 a year, foreign and domestic postage included; single numbers are \$2.50 for regular issues, and \$4.00 for the Bibliography.
