## Oh, China!

Elementary Reader of Modern Chinese for Advanced Beginners Chih-p'ing Chou, Perry Link, and Xuedong Wang

*Oh, China!* is a textbook for the growing number of advanced beginners who are studying Mandarin Chinese. These are students who, usually because of their Chinese family backgrounds, can speak and understand elementary Mandarin but cannot read or write well enough for an intermediate course. This book offers help with what they most need: reading and writing, grammar, and achievement of standard pronunciation.

The content of the lessons has been chosen to appeal specifically to advanced beginners. Each lesson is given in both traditional and simplified characters, and, for the first fifteen lessons, in hanyu pinyin as well. The lessons are accompanied by vocabulary lists, grammar notes, usage exercises, and character stroke-order charts. The book begins with a detailed chapter on foundation work in Mandarin pronunciation, complete with exercises. It concludes with a complete Chinese-to-English vocabulary index.

*Oh, Chinal* is designed for a one year course at the college level and will prepare students to enter third-year courses. The latest in a series of Chinese-language texts published by Princeton University Press, it will meet an important and growing need in the teaching and study of Mandarin.

## Rereading the Stone

Desire and the Making of Fiction in Dream of the Red Chamber

#### Anthony C. Yu

The eighteenth-century Hongloumeng, known in English as Dream of the Red Chamber or The Story of the Stone, is generally considered to be the greatest of Chinese novels. In this path-breaking study, Anthony Yu goes beyond the customary view of Hongloumeng as a vivid reflection of late imperial Chinese culture by examining the novel as a story about fictive representation.

Article manuscripts, including notes, should not exceed 40 pages in length. Please submit four copies and a disk (preferably formatted to WordPerfect 5.1). All submitted work should be double-spaced, including extracts, notes, and references. Consult recent issues of the *Journal* as a guide to format. Footnotes should be as few as possible, and typed double-spaced at the end of the text. Documentation should follow the style recommended in sections 16.3 through 16.28 of the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 14th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1993), pp. 641-51. Authors are encouraged to submit tables, figures, maps, photographs, and other illustrations along with their manuscripts; please consult the editor for specifications. Additional guidelines on manuscript preparation will be sent upon request.

All manuscripts submitted to the JAS are expected not to have been published elsewhere and not be under review for possible publication elsewhere. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.
