NEWS FOR THE MEMBERS

SCHOLAR-DIPLOMAT SEMINARS AT THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE -- This program allows university faculty members to spend a week in the Department directly observing the foreign policy process and discussing current policy issues. During the week in Washington each scholar is assigned to a host officer whose work is related to the scholar's major interest. Consequently, the scholar is given an opportunity to observe a particular officer's work, discuss policy issues, contribute ideas, and perform specialized research (with access to classified files). Part of the week is devoted to group sessions on subjects of broad interest within the overall geographic or functional focus of the seminar. These sessions usually include one or two other government agencies involved in the foreign policy process.

Seminar participants are drawn from a list of qualified applicants who have expressed an interest in a given subject. A typical candidate for the Program would be a tenured professor whose background in writing and teaching in international relations are relevant to the area seminar for which he or she is applying. Additionally, applicants should hold memberships in professional associations or societies, be involved in campus and/or community civic activities and have the written endorsement of their department Dean, past seminar participants, or other appropriate persons. Travel and lodging is at the scholar or his university. All candidates must be U.S. citizens. A tentative schedule for Academic year 1977-78 follows:
