The CTI Centre for Modern Languages has been involved in various conferences during the summer, and we have also visited a number of university and polytechnic Modern Languages departments to demonstrate and give information about software. Indeed, we are already making bookings for Spring 1992.

Donations of new software have been very encouraging recently, as have offers of reviews and user reports. Some of those submitted have had to be deferred until the May issue of ReCALL, but I hope this will not deter others from writing reviews: we may even consider a special Software Reviews issue.

In the near future we hope to collate and analyse the results of the 'Which Software' questionnaire which formed part of ReCALL\NewsSheet 6. Please complete and return these if you have not already done so. Extra copies are enclosed with this issue of ReCALL.

Overseas readers will receive with this issue a letter giving details of our Overseas Subscription rates. Until recently we have supplied ReCALL and the NewsSheets free of charge, even though our funding covers the UK university sector only. However, we must now try to offset the extra printing and postage costs, and I hope those overseas readers who are currently on the mailing list will feel it worthwhile to continue.

The good news is that the Universities Funding Council has voted to continue funding the CTI Centres until July 1993, so we look forward to maintaining and developing our activities.
