The surgical treatment of benign and malignant lesions of the larynx and pharynx will be presented in lectures, motion picture films, and demonstrations. Registrants will perform various surgical procedures on the cadaver.

The course director is Dr. John A. Kirchner, professor of otolaryngology. In addition to faculty from the Yale University School of Medicine, Dr. Joseph H. Ogura and Dr. Max L. Som will serve as guest faculty.



Instruments for Myringoplasty or Tympanoplasty

by Dr. J. Marquet (Antwerp)





These instruments were designed with a view to obtaining a perfect dissection of the epithelial layer of the tympanic remains as well as a perfect dissection of the skin of the meatal wall. This is done from within, working outwards, in order to conserve intact, the nourishing vessels which are required to invade the graft.

This particular technique, described by Dr. J. Marquet, for implantation of homografts of drums, is also valid for implantation of other materials, such as facia in myringoplasty or tympanoplasty.

L 275-10 Set complete in case.

L 275-11 1. Sickle knife right for incision of epithelial layer.

L 275-12 2. Sickle knife left for incision of epithelial layer. L 275-13 3. Elevator for dissection of the epithelial layer.

L 275-14 4. Elevator for dissection of the epithelial layer with slanting surface, bottom to top.

L 275-15 5. Elevator for dissection of the epithelial layer with slanting surface, top to bottom.

L 275-16 Case only for above.
