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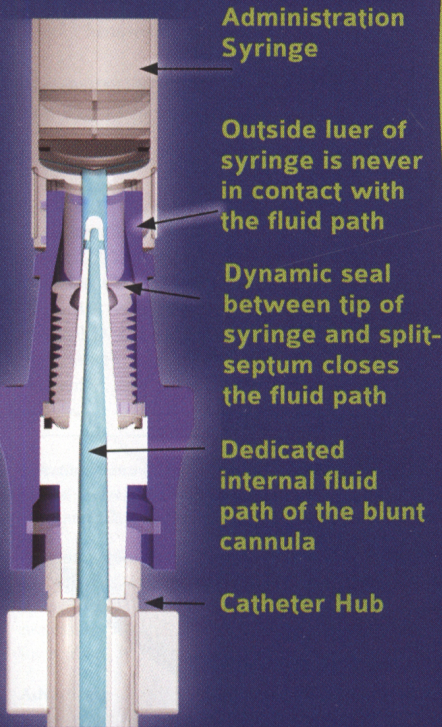
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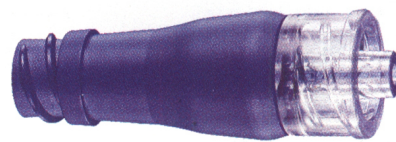
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- CLAVE was proven to support a lower occurrence of bloodstream infections when compared to a positive pressure device. (*Maragakis, 2006*)
