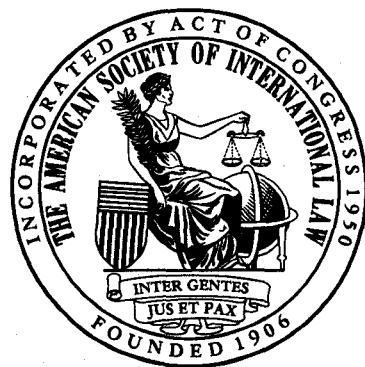



INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE RED CROSS (ICRC) JOINT SEMINAR FOR
UNIVERSITY TEACHERS ON INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN LAW

The ICRC and the Graduate Institute of International Studies, assisted by a generous grant from the Hauser Foundation, will hold a training seminar on International Humanitarian Law (IHL) in Geneva on August 7-12, 2000. Applicants should be full-time university teachers who are already teaching public international law or human rights and who are ready to make a commitment to teach IHL in their schools. Participants should plan to arrive on August 6th and depart on August 12th, and they will be provided with APEX type airfare and living expenses.

The co-directors of the joint seminar are Professor Theodor Meron, of the New York University School of Law and of the Graduate Institute of International Studies, and Mr. Antoine Bouvier, a Legal Adviser at the ICRC. Experts from academia, practice and the ICRC will provide instruction in English. They will cover IHL, aspects of human rights law and international criminal law applicable to international and internal armed conflicts (e.g. historical development, types of conflict, Geneva law, The Hague law, prisoners of war, occupation, humanitarian assistance, customary law, war crimes and responsibility), the place of IHL within international law and teaching methods. Each participant will be provided with a course book to assist his/her future teaching.

The seminar has thirty seats available. To apply, send a complete CV and publications list, a statement explaining your interest in and plans for teaching IHL, and two recommendations to Isabelle Gerardi, Graduate Institute of International Studies, 132 rue de Lausanne, P.O. Box 36, 1211 Geneva 21, Switzerland. Applications must be received by February 15, 2000. Applicants will receive admission decisions by April 31, 2000.
