THE NATURE CONSERVANCY—THE FIRST TEN YEARS. From the Nature Conservancy, 19 Belgrave Square, London, S.W. 1. Price 1s. 6d.

This is a popular account of the Nature Conservancy since its foundation by Royal Charter on 23rd March, 1949. It briefly explains the organization and work of the Conservancy, the purpose of its researches and how the money allotted by the Treasury, £350,000 in 1958–59, is spent. A coloured map shows the name, position, approximate size of the seventy-two national nature reserves in Great Britain and of the other local reserves, wildfowl refuges and research stations with which the conservancy is concerned. The booklet is pleasantly illustrated.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE TANGANYIKA NATIONAL PARKS, JULY, 1957–JULY, 1958. From the National Parks Office, Arusha. 2sh. 50c.

The report starts with a summary of the principles which guided the Serengeti Committee of Enquiry and of the recommendations which resulted therefrom. The modifications imposed by the second Serengeti White Paper follows and the report points out that both the future of the wild life in the Ngorongoro Crater and the maintenance of the full migratory cycle of the Serengeti herds, will depend on recognition of their importance by the administrators of the new Conservation Unit.

A brief description of the new Serengeti National Park is given, with a map, and of the research done by Dr. Bernhard Grzimek and his son Michael. Seven pages are devoted to interesting "Game Incidents".

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE UGANDA NATIONAL PARKS, JULY, 1957–JUNE, 1958. Uganda Argus Ltd., Kampala. 1sh. 50c.

In the foreword, Mr. R. L. E. Dreşchfield, Chairman of the Trustees, tells us that a part of Kigezi which borders the Parc National Albert, has been included in the Queen Elizabeth National Park. This area was especially mentioned in the Secretary's report on his African tour, *Oryx* IV, 4, p. 244, and is very important because of its herd of 1,000 topi and its kob.

Before consenting to this addition to the park, the Kigezi District Councillors visited it, and leaving their Land Rovers, went out on to the open plain. "Then the topi came thundering
