The Role of Labour-Intensive Sectors in Japanese Industrialization

There still exists in Japan today small-scale, labour-intensive industries which have survived Japan's rapid growth and continues to play a critical part in development. This fact is demonstrated by author Johzen Takeuchi, a professor of Economic History at Hiroshima University, in tracing the small-scale, labour-intensive industries in Japan from the Meiji period (1868-1912) up to World War II.
