Announcing the First EEA Summer School UNEMPLOYMENT IN OPEN ECONOMIES

**Universidade Catolica Portuguesa, Lisboa
3-14 September 1990**

The Department of Economics of the Portuguese Catholic University will organize the first Summer School of the European Economic Association under the financing of the Stimulation Plan for Economic Science (SPES). The subject chosen is unemployment in open economies.

The Summer School will be held immediately after the EEA congress, from 3 to 14 September 1990. It is open to students engaged in the preparation of a doctoral dissertation. There will be room for a maximum of 25 students who will be chosen for their preparation to participate in advanced study on the subject. They will have the opportunity to attend lectures on advanced topics by participating faculty and to present their own research for discussion.
