

Admirably chosen, they illustrate the development of French architecture from the bare simplicity of the Merovingian baptistery of Saint-Jean at Poitiers or the crypt at Jouarre to the marvels of Flamboyant design such as the south porch at Louviers. An interesting and instructive book to travel with, it is good too to muse over at home in one's study."—Notes and Queries.
