Among the smaller Allied nations, Norway was perhaps the most successful in establishing excellent working relations with Great Britain, and yet it was never subservient. Twenty-five expert contributors examine the Anglo-Norwegian alliance

on land, at sea and in the air, with chapters devoted to such topics as the Norwegian merchant fleet (the largest in the world) and the 'Shetland Bus' operations. They also provide unique insights into Norway's role in the gathering of wartime intelligence, including the background to the sinking of the *Bismarck*, as well as sabotage operations such as the destruction of the heavy water plant at Rjukan in 1943.

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
