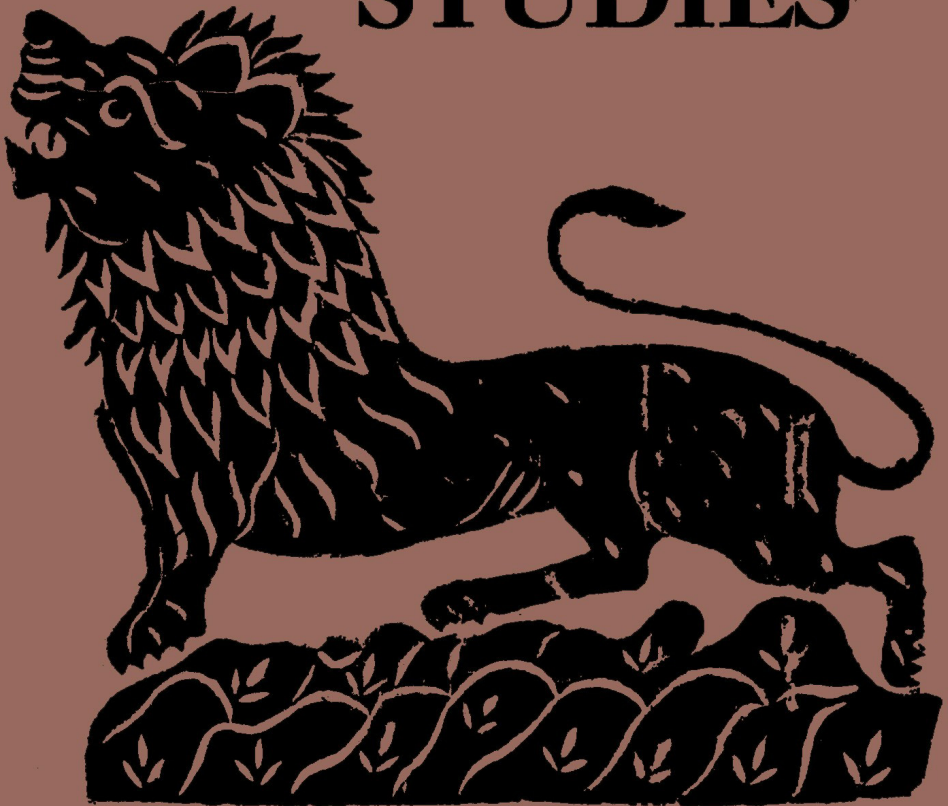

## CONTRIBUTORS TO THIS ISSUE

Peter K. Cline is Assistant Professor at the University of California at Davis. This article is his first effort. He is currently writing a book on the politics of the postwar economic transition in Great Britain, 1918-1924.

Carolyn A. Edie, Associate Professor of History at the University of Illinois, Chicago Circle, is the author of *The Irish Cattle Bills: A Study in Restoration Politics*, published this year, and two earlier articles. She is now at work on a study on the political character of the Restoration settlement.

John S. Galbraith, Professor of History at the University of California at Los Angeles, is the author of *The Hudson's Bay Company as an Imperial Factor* and of *Reluctant Empire*. He has written several articles on the history of the British Empire. Currently he is at work on a study of the nineteenth century chartered companies.

Donald Greene is Leo S. Bing Professor of English at the University of Southern California. He is the author of *The Politics of Samuel Johnson* and editor of *Samuel Johnson: A Collection of Critical Essays*. His most recent publication is *The Age of Exuberance: Backgrounds to Eighteenth-Century English Literature*.

Gertrude Himmelfarb is Professor of History at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York and the author of *Victorian Minds*, of *Darwin and the Darwinian Revolution* and of *Lord Acton: A Study in Conscience and Politics*.

Robert A. Huttenback, Professor of History and Dean of Students at the California Institute of Technology, is the author of *British Relations with Sind, 1799-1843; An Anatomy of Imperialism* and of *The British Imperial Experience*. He is also a co-author of *Himalayan Battleground; Sino-Indian Rivalry in Ladakh*. Appearing in the fall is *Gandhi in South Africa*. He is currently working on a history of Kashmir as an imperial factor and on a comparative study of racism and imperialism in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Canada.

W. R. Jones is Professor of History and chairman of the department at the University of New Hampshire. He has published other articles on medieval studies.

J. G. A. Pocock, Professor of History, Washington University, is the author of *The Ancient Constitution and the Feudal Law*, and is shortly to publish *Politics, Language and Time: Essays on Political Thought and History*. He is currently preparing an edition of the works of James Harrington.
