I am confident that this help will be as generously extended to my successor. On a personal note, I would also like to thank Ann Rogers, who assisted me while I was at Lancaster and Chris Thurling who took over as my assistant when I moved to Bristol. Finally, I offer my best wishes to Paul Taylor with the hope that he finds his tenure as editor as fulfilling as I have.
