#### The Crisis in Kosovo 1989-1999:

### From the Dissolution of Yugoslavia to Rambouillet and the Outbreak of Hostilities

This book provides all the materials necessary for an understanding of the developments leading up to the hostilities in Kosovo and places them in context through critical analysis.

The book opens with an analysis of the Kosovo problem furnished by the Yugoslav Federal Government and by the elected Government of Kosovo respectively. There then follow materials detailing the development of Kosovo's constitutional status, including its declaration of independence and independent constitution.

The book then turns to the attempts of the international community to address the Kosovo issue, initially within the 1992 London Conference, the Geneva follow-on talks and the deployment and operation of the Long-term Monitoring Mission of the Conference (now Organization) for Security and Cooperation in Europe. The responses of the various United Nations-based international human rights bodies to the developing situation are also chronicled extensively.

In the following chapters, the international reaction to the increase in violence in Kosovo throughout 1998 and early 1999 is detailed through the responses of the Security Council, the UN Secretary-General, the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia, the EU and the International Contact Group, and the International Committee of the Red Cross. The threat of the use of force by NATO and the Yugoslav response is also featured.

There then follows an analysis of the so-called Holbrooke agreement of October 1998 on the limitation of Yugoslav forces in Kosovo, the OSCE verification mission and NATO aerial monitoring.

The proposals for a settlement developed by US Ambassador Hill in 1998/9 are then considered, along with the attempt of the Contact Group to impose a settlement within the space of a few weeks at the Rambouillet talks and the Paris follow-on negotiations. This section features a substantive analysis of the unorthodox Rambouillet process of enforced negotiation plus all the necessary texts illuminating the negotiating history of the proposed settlement that resulted from it.

The volume concludes with some materials relating to the commencement of the use of force against the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia by NATO—a topic to be more fully developed in Volume 2 of the Series.

All chapters are introduced by a substantial analytical presentation, explaining the role and authority of the international actors of relevance to the particular chapter and assessing their actions. The significance of the individual documents is explained in their wider context and developments are linked across chapters through the introductory narrative.

To ease an understanding of this episode in its wider setting, the general introduction also addresses some of the underlying issues brought out by the Kosovo crisis. These include problems of human and minority rights, claims to statehood and self-determination and the issue of intervention.

The volume features an extensive chronology of events and two orientation maps.

and the Renewed Search for a Settlement This volume chronicles the initiation and conduct of NATO armed action. It covers Security Council debates and submissions, NATO reports, International Court of Justice pleadings and orders and the positions of states critical of the operation. This material is supported by a substantive analysis of the doctrine of so-called humanitarian intervention, the question of the primacy of the Security Council and the issue of proportionality. Aspects of the jus ad bellum are also addressed. The campaign of ethnic cleansing is illuminated through materials relating to war crimes allegations, including the indictment issued by the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia and the reports of humanitarian agencies. The peace initiatives put forward throughout the conflict and the modalities of the cessation of hostilities and for the withdrawal of Yugoslav forces are also addressed.
