## **Manuscript Submission**

What to submit: Five copies of the manuscript and an abstract of about 100 words, together with a brief biographical description of the author(s). Manuscripts submitted to the *Review* must not be under consideration by another publication. Manuscripts cannot be returned to authors.

**Manuscript format:** Delete all identifying references from four of the five copies of your manuscript. Text, including footnotes and references, should be double spaced with 1-inch margins. Footnotes, references, tables, and figures should be placed at the end. An abridged style sheet is published regularly in the *Review*; a full style sheet is available on request.
