## THE HENRY BARNARD PRICE Call for Submissions

The History of Education Society will award the Henry Barnard Prize in 2003 for the best graduate student essay in the history of education. Nominations by faculty, graduate advisers, department chairs, and deans, as well as self-nominations by students, are welcome. The postmark deadline for submissions is April 15, 2003. Essays should be no longer than 25 pages exclusive of notes. The winner will be invited to deliver her/his paper at the Fall 2003 meeting of the History of Education Society and to publish the essay in the History of Education Quarterly. The Prize also carries an honorarium of \$500.

The Prize Committee will define history of education broadly to include work on schools, teachers, higher education, families, and a wide range of cultural and educational institutions. The Society reserves the right not to award the prize if the Committee makes such a recommendation.

## Claude C. Eggertsen Dissertation Prize: Call for Submissions

The History of Education Society is accepting submissions for the Claude C. Eggertsen Prize for dissertation judged to be the most outstanding in the field of History of Education. The prize carries an award of \$1000 for the winner, to be awarded at the History of Education Society annual meeting in October 2003. Qualified applicants must have completed the dissertation and graduated during the calendar year 2002.

Deadline for submissions is May 16, 2003. Please include a cover letter, brief c.v., one page abstract, and a copy of the dissertation to:

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Guidelines for submissions:

- 1. All copy should be typed double-spaced, including between and *within* footnotes. Allow approximately a one-inch margin on all four sides of the page.
- 2. Articles should be no more than 35 *pages including* endnotes; (or, no more than 9,000 words).
- 3. Article font should be 10 characters per inch (or pica type).
- 4. Four copies of the manuscript should be submitted on white paper, addressed to the *History of Education Quarterly*, College of Education, Slippery Rock University, Slippery Rock, PA 16057-1326. *Manuscripts are not returned unless a self-addressed envelope with sufficient postage accompanies the article*.
- 5. The author's name should appear *only* on the title page of the article.
- 6. Footnotes should be listed in a separate section at the end of the article. The following formats should be used for references: Book:


