Herbert Butterfield, Regius Professor of History at Cambridge University and Master of Peterhouse, is the author of *The Origins of Modern Science, George III and the Historians*, and many other books.

William A. Chaney is George McKendree Steele Associate Professor of History at Lawrence University. He is the author of a number of articles on Anglo-Saxon history.
