CORRESPONDENCE

To the Editors of THE CLASSICAL REVIEW.

I HAVE to thank Professor Souter for the kindness of his review of the First Volume of the text of Livy edited by Professor Walters and myself, and also for the letter in your December number rectifying the unintentional omission of Professor Walters' name. The omission was perhaps partly the result of the arrangement which Professor Walters and I made (following the allocation of responsibility by the publishers), that the signature to the Preface in the First Volume should be mine alone, and in subsequent Volumes his alone. This seems to have led even the most friendly of reviewers to overlook the explicit description given in the Preface of the full share which Professor Walters had in the work. I did not foresee this possibility; but as perhaps I ought to have done, I should like now to add that it is less than the truth to say that Professor Walters was 'consulted about the text throughout.' Every single divergence of reading, save the most minute, was carefully discussed by us together; and quite apart from the improvements in the text due to Professor Walters and given as his, and apart from his full share in the task of collecting the evidence of the manuscripts, there is not a single articulate note in the commentary which he has not either discussed in draft or drafted himself. As the titlepage states, the book is a joint work in the fullest sense of the word, though no one but myself can realise how much positive good has been added, and how much error subtracted, by Professor Walters' wise and devoted collaboration. I should be happy indeed if I could succeed in contributing as much to the value of subsequent volumes as he has done to that of the first.—Yours faithfully.
