## Project '87 Update

In 1984, Project '87, the joint effort of the American Historical Association and the American Political Science Association to commemorate the Bicentennial of the Constitution, has continued to plan and implement scholarly, educational and public programs to enhance understanding of the Constitution. Each year, we have reported on our activities to the members of the sponsoring associations and we look forward to your comments and your participation. The last update on Project '87 appeared in *PS*, Fall 1983. Funding from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, which provides core support to Project '87, has been renewed for 1985 through 1987.

## Scholarship

One of Project '87's primary goals has been to support scholarship on the Constitution. In the past, the Project has provided support for individual scholars and has mounted scholarly conferences and published the conference papers. In 1984, the National Endowment for the Humanities awarded a grant that will en-

able Project '87 to provide research assistance for the compilation of a supplement to Max Farrand's *Records of the Federal Convention*. James Hutson, chief of the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress, will edit the volume. The research will be done by Leonard Rapport, an archivist with extensive experience in the collection of documents pertaining to the federal period. Yale University Press, which published the original set of Farrand volumes, will publish the supplement, at the same time it reissues the first three volumes.

## Education

In order to encourage the incorporation of new scholarship into curriculum materials, Project '87 has supported a variety of educational programs aimed at pre-college and college audiences.

## Secondary School Materials

*Lessons on the Constitution*, a collection of more than 60 lessons for high school students developed under the aegis of Project '87, will be published this winter. Developed by John Patrick, University of Indiana, and Richard Remy, Ohio State University, with the support of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the lessons have been extensively tested and revised. Scott, Foresman, textbook publisher, has contributed funds toward printing. Paul Finkelman, State University of New York, Binghamton, served as historical consultant.

## College Faculty Seminars

Educational activities for college faculty have been supported for the past two years by the Lilly Endowment, Inc., of Indianapolis, Indiana, which provided

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funds to hold four week-long seminars on the Constitution each year during the summer months. The seminars were designed to enable college faculty in history and political science to incorporate new scholarship on the Constitution in their introductory courses. A course team, headed by Herman Belz, History Department, University of Maryland, will develop the curriculum materials and advise on the television programs. #### Public Programs

To extend the reach of materials developed for the Bicentennial of the Constitution, and to engage the public in discussions about the Constitution, Project '87 has undertaken the development of several programs aimed at public audiences. Many of these will be done in conjunction with other organizations which are also involved in Bicentennial programs.

#### *this Constitution*

Project '87 began the publication of its magazine, *this Constitution*, as a quarterly in 1984. A grant received from the

National Endowment for the Humanities supports its publication and distribution to planners of Bicentennial programs. The National Council for the Social Studies has made an arrangement with Project '87 to send *this Constitution* to its membership of 14,000 social studies teachers, curriculum developers and school officials, beginning with the Fall, 1984, issue. Almost 25,000 readers now receive the magazine. Through the USIA and the Asia Foundation, *this Constitution* is also distributed abroad; more than 1,500 copies are mailed outside the United States, including 40 to Katmandu, and one to Ouagadougou.

#### Bicentennial Exhibit

A second program aimed at reaching out to a large public audience is being developed in cooperation with Independence National Historical Park and state humanities councils across the country. Modeled on the very successful exhibit created for the Treaty of Paris Bicentennial, a paper exhibit dealing with the Constitution will be created by a Project '87 task force and members of the other cooperating organizations. It will be distributed by the state humanities councils in conjunction with series of lectures and book discussion groups led by scholars in local communities. A proposal will be submitted to the National Endowment for the Humanities to fund this program.

#### Conferences

In addition, Project '87 will be working with Independence Park and other organizations, including the League of

Women Voters, to mount a conference for the Bicentennial of the opening of the Constitutional Convention in May, 1987. Other conferences will mark the Bicentennials of the Mount Vernon Conference and the Annapolis Conference, undertaken with the appropriate state agencies and local organizations in those areas. These conferences will feature scholars, public officials, educators and students

and in most cases will be open to the public. Some may be televised. Funding for these conferences is being sought from private foundations and corporations.

**American Council of Learned Societies**

The American Council of Learned Societies will award a limited number of travel grants to IPSA Congress participants presenting papers on humanistic topics. **National Science Foundation**

The National Science Foundation has granted the American Political Science Association \$30,000 for travel grants to political scientists presenting scientific papers or organizing and chairing panels at the IPSA Congress with the greatest promise of increasing theoretical and empirical understanding of basic political processes. Those who received NSF travel grants to the 1982 IPSA World Congress will not be eligible for support in 1985. Fifty grants of \$600 each will be awarded. The selections will be made by a committee appointed by President Richard F.
