Question: Does your Canadian ED have a computer system for tracking patient visits to analyze length of stay and acuity?

Response: 31% said Yes.

Q: Do your emergency physicians see regular reports documenting length of stay and acuity profiles for the patient visits to your Canadian ED?

R: 9% said Yes.

Q: Are you using the Canadian Triage and Acuity Scale in your Canadian ED?

R: 50% said Yes.

Q: Do you have a current Disaster Plan in your Canadian ED?

R: 86% said Yes.

Q: Do you currently use low molecular weight heparins in your ED for the treatment of acute coronary syndromes?

R: 15% said Yes.

Q: Do you currently use low molecular weight heparins in your ED for the treatment of deep venous thrombosis? **R:** 95% said Yes.

Q: Do you believe the choice of thrombolytic for acute myocardial infarction has been clarified sufficiently?

R: 51% said Yes.

Q: Are you using ketamine for pediatric sedation in your Canadian ED? **R:** 41% said Yes.
