The booklet is completed by a series of 50 questions to be answered by the reader, and by a collection of examples drawn out from novels or essays.

An interesting booklet, dealing with a number of main problems related to public health in the African countries. Biological, hygienic, economic and especially organizational problems are examined; past and present conditions are studied, in order to better find out what the future perspectives of medicine and development in these countries may be.

The first volume in a series of international historical statistics, this book consists in three parts.

The first part concerns the evolution of the working population and of its structure, by country, sex, type of activity, etc.

The second part consists in a detailed study of the structure of the working population of eight countries: Germany, Belgium, France, United States, Japan, Great Britain, Soviet Union, and India.

The third part is a collection of the bibliography on the subject, listing the main references on the working population by country.
