Contributions are invited from scholars working in all disciplines in the Humanities and Social Sciences, and should deal with the Philippines, Timor Lorosae, Indonesia, Brunei Darussalam, Singapore, Malaysia, Myanmar, Thailand, Cambodia, Laos or Vietnam.

The preferred length of article is between 9,000 and 12,000 words, inclusive of footnotes. Articles which exceed or fall short of this length will be considered only at the Editor's discretion. The articles must be oriented toward a readership composed of scholars working in various disciplines, but written to be accessible to non-specialists.

Materials should be fully documented and have enduring value. Analyses of current affairs that may quickly fall out of date, and pieces containing policy prescriptions, are rarely accepted.

Submission of an article will be taken to mean that it has not been previously published and that it is not on offer to any other publisher.
