

The Awards Committee of the Congress on Research in Dance is pleased to announce the launch of the 2016 Awards nomination and selection process. **Nominations are due by February 15, 2016.**

The CORD awards were established to recognize scholarly excellence, to contribute to motivating further research, and as a signal to the scholarly world at large the work of the individuals recognized.

The awards contribute not only to the visibility of the individuals and works honored, but also to the visibility of dance research and to our continuing drive for excellence in dance scholarship. Consider your nomination a way to influence the field and the CORD organization.

The awards committee seeks nominations for the following awards. 2016 awardees will be acknowledged at the 2016 CORD+SDHS Conference at Pomona College in Claremont, California, November 3 - 6, 2016.

The Oscar G. Brockett Book Prize for Dance Research

The Oscar G. Brockett Book Prize for Dance Research will be awarded each year to the best book in dance published during the previous three calendar years (2013, 2014, 2015). The award comes with a cash prize of \$1,000, provided by the Oscar G. Brockett Center for Theatre History and Criticism at the University of Texas Austin provides the monetary prize.

The Dixie Durr Award for Outstanding Service to Dance Research

This award recognizes the indispensable aid rendered the field of dance studies by people who sustain existing structures, institutions, and organizations for dance research. The award calls attention to superlative labor, especially, but not limited to, unpaid labor performed for extended periods of time.

The Award for Outstanding Scholarly Research in Dance

This award honors an exceptional scholar or leader for sustained contributions to dance research. Selection may be based on a significant body of work, a single contribution that has a major lasting impact on scholarly dance research, or leadership that furthers the field. Any area of dance scholarship is eligible.

The Outstanding Graduate Research Award


The CORD Graduate Research Award recognizes an outstanding research paper (or papers) prepared by individuals currently pursuing graduate studies. Papers will be evaluated based on their originality of research, articulation of argument, and clarity of writing.

The Outstanding Publication Award

This award recognizes outstanding publications. "Publication" is interpreted to include any publicly accessible items such as journal articles, books, films, CDs/DVDS, computer software or other electronic products. Subjects may embrace any area of scholarly research.
