'This book describes some of the ways in which physics has been applied to archæology. It is intended both for the general scientific reader and for the student of *Archæometry*—measurements made on archæological material. . . . I hope, too, that it will be useful to the physicist who wishes to divert some of his skills to the aid of his archæological colleagues—particularly the chapters on magnetic location and resistivity surveying. It is, however, a mistake to regard the subject matter solely as "scientific aids", for the fruits of co-operation can flow both ways: in magnetic dating, for instance, archæological evidence is vital to our knowledge of the past behaviour of the earth's magnetic field. . . . I do not believe there is any question of the new techniques sweeping all before them. Their evidence must take its place with the other pieces of jigsaw that the archæologist has to fit together. To do this he must know the weight to give that evidence. A physicist is not a machine that, when fed with material, regurgitates an archæological answer acceptable without qualifications. I hope this book may help archæologists to understand those qualifications. . . .'
