Papers should indicate the wider significance of detailed original research findings as well as the logic and limitations of specialized techniques of analysis. Comments and shorter notes are also welcome. The JOURNAL does not accept unsolicited book reviews, nor can it honor requests to review particular works. Contributions should be typed double-spaced. Footnotes, also double-spaced, should be grouped at the end of the paper, along with figures and tables. Four copies of each manuscript should be submitted. Prospective contributors may obtain a copy of the Style Sheet for the JOURNAL from the Editorial Office. A submission fee of \$20.00 or a year's membership (fee schedule below) is required from nonmembers of the Association.
