ANNOUNCEMENT OF ELEVENTH ROUND TABLE, MEXICO CITY

The Eleventh Round Table of the Sociedad Mexicana de Antropología will be held in Mexico City, August 8–13, 1966, on the theme of Teotihuacán. Although topics to be treated are not limited to archaeology, the theme enforces a strong preponderance of archaeological approaches. Planning has been under way for a year, and a division of papers and discussions into related groupings will make it possible for almost everyone to hear all the papers he is particularly interested in. By no means all will be presented in Spanish; as in previous years, a strong contingent of foreign participants is expected. The series began with the now classic round table on Tula and Teotihuacán (1941); and second (1942) established the series as productive of fundamental advances with its discussions of the Mayas and the "Olmec" problem.
