Your Mind in Their Hands. Documentary series on mental illness. Sunday, BBC 1, 11.25 pm.

Despite increasing attempts through the media to rid psychiatry of its bad image, it seems the layman still views it with an aura of suspicion. There is a need to show just how ordinary and beneficient it is.

Your Mind in Their Hands, a new series of eight, 25-minute programmes from the Continuing Education Series of the BBC, examined mental illness within the National Health Service and focused particularly on the various methods of cure.

The first programme considered phobias and how behaviour therapy has revolutionized their treatment. Successive topics were the patient's first contact with the GP (which might have been better screened first), ECT, a typical psychiatric department of a district general hospital, the treatment of depression and schizophrenia, the care of the elderly, including the use of reality orientation, and rounding off with rehabilitation. Case studies were featured in each programme.

From the opening programmes, the format appeared to be

naming the problem (be it agoraphobia, alcoholism, depression . .), naming the chosen cure, a quick demonstration of the treatment—and there was the 'cured' patient. There was little that was convincing or reassuring; it all felt rather too slick. Surely it isn't that easy?

Perhaps the most controversial subject covered was ECT. Given this, it was surprising that absolutely no attempt was made to discuss or justify it. Although the presenter, Dr Alan Maryon-Davies, thought it necessary to tell us that we weren't to believe it was a magic 'cure all', it certainly looked like it—the convulsion itself probably made a few viewers sit up and take note. From a lay point of view the presentation did look very uncritical.

But in spite of these shortcomings, which may or may not have been apparent throughout the series, in attempting to demonstrate ways in which mental illness manifests itself and showing how those afflicted are helped through sympathy and understanding, even before treatment, the series should succeed in demystifying certain aspects of psychiatry and showing that there is plenty of good in it.
