



Three Elegies of Ch'u

An Introduction to the Traditional Interpretation of the Ch'u T'zu

Geoffrey R. Waters

Geoffrey R. Waters provides a translation of three of the "Nine Elegies," ascribed to Ch'ü Yüan and recorded in the second-century A.D. anthology of Chinese literature known as the *Ch'u T'zu*.

He also has translated the four extant commentaries upon those three elegies written between the second and twelfth centuries A.D. By translating integrally and then analyzing the commentaries, Waters demonstrates that the traditional interpretation of the poems was radically different from that suggested by modern Western and Chinese scholars. This work will be of value not only to students of traditional Chinese literature, but—because of Waters' original methodology—to students of comparative literature and literary interpretation in any language.

Waters' systematic translation and use of the traditional commentaries is particularly crucial because it allows a reconstruction of the poems' traditional meaning in all their facets—philological, lexical, and historical. Contemporary scholars, by dismissing the traditional commentaries or using them sparingly, have reduced these elegies to examples of shaman lore. In fact, Waters argues,

the poems communicate a far more complex political statement, and were understood as doing so by the early commentators. Taking us step by step from text to commentaries, he suggests that the elegies represent the political philosophy, cosmology, and tragic allegory of Ch'ü Yüan, the high Minister of State driven to suicide because of his inability to reconcile himself with his king.

By illuminating the original meaning of the texts, Waters explicates more than a literary work. His ambitious scholarship ultimately reveals a society from the inside and allows us to glimpse a lost, uniquely Chinese world of cultural forms and processes.

Geoffrey R. Waters' translations of Chinese and Tibetan poetry have appeared in a variety of journals and literary magazines. He is the author of works on Asian literature, film, and business. His translation of the poetry of the T'ang poet Yü Hsuan-chi appeared in *A Book of Women Poets from Antiquity to Now* (Schocken Books, 1980).

Deference and Defiance in Nineteenth-Century Japan

William W. Kelly

This book, in contrast, argues for the primacy of internal sources of agrarian radicalism and for the importance of the variable local conditions that mediate forces of modernization. Focusing on the years from 1940 to 1972, Marshall Bouton analyzes the emergence and subsidence of agrarian radicalism in the district of Thanjavur in the southern Indian state of Tamil Nadu. He also explains why forces of commercialization and technological change have failed to produce a revolutionary response throughout India's still primarily agrarian society. \$42.00

The Dutch East India Company and the Economy of Bengal, 1630-1720

Om Prakash

Om Prakash reveals the central role played by Bengal in the Dutch East India Company's activities in India in the seventeenth and the early eighteenth century and the resulting integration of India into the world economy. By the early 1700s, Bengal provided almost 40 percent of the value of Asian goods sent to Holland, and over half of all textiles exported from Asia by the Company. Long before this, the Company had carried goods from Bengal all over Asia. Drawing on little-used documents in the General State Archives in The Hague, the author discusses the place of the Company in Bengal from the beginnings of its trading operations there in the 1630s until about 1720. \$38.50


