Social Protest and Popular Culture in Eighteenth-Century Japan ANNE WALTHALL

Social protest in rural Japan during the Tenmai years of 1781-1788 is now made more comprehensible through popular songs, confessions, chronicles, and tales that present the commoner's view of the times. Anne Walthall systematically relates political behavior to religious and cultural practices in a work which is about popular culture as much as political conflict.

Background information on the political, economic, and social structure of Tokugawa feudalism gives the reader an understanding of how and why conflict occurred. General trends of the late eighteenth century-including the increased frequency and violence of protest-are also related to fundamental changes in commerce, agriculture, and administration to illuminate the generality of the specific events described.

It is expected that authors and reviewers will be members of the Association for Asian Studies except for foreign scholars and individuals whose main area of interest is not Asia. Manuscripts should be typed on 8 $1/2 \times 11$ bond, double-spaced. Authors are urged to consult recent issues of the Journal to observe the format for references. Footnotes must be in the form recommended in sections 15.4-15.35 of A Manual of Style, 113th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1982), typed double-spaced, and placed at the end of the manuscripts, including footnotes, should not be more than 40 pages in length. Three copies with text, footnotes, and list of references, all double-spaced, should be enclosed. Because it is impossible to return manuscripts, please do not send the original. All manuscripts submitted to the Journal are expected ont to have been published elsewhere and not to be under review elsewhere. After manuscripts have been accepted and edited, authors who have composed them on word processors are encouraged to submit a final version on a diskette.
