Articles and notes may deal with processes (e.g., underlying representations, linguistic production, comprehension and memory), etiology (where appropriate), development, social and other environmental interactions, assessment, intervention and pedagogy, but must reflect the journal's basic research and theory orientation toward applied psycholinguistics.
