# POLITICS, THE CONSTITUTION, AND THE SUPREME COURT

Loren P. Beth, University of Massachusetts. An introduction to the study of constitutional law, this book emphasizes the things that political science students should know about our judiciary: the role it plays in our political system, the reasons why it has been given such a role, and how it performs. Primarily useful as a supplement to the usual case or text materials used in the constitutional law course, and may also be used as supplementary reading in other courses. *About 192 pp. Probably \$2.00.* Ready in March, 1962.

## THE SUPREME COURT AND AMERICAN ECONOMIC LIFE

Benjamin Munn Ziegler, Amherst College. A collection of thirty-seven land-mark decisions of the Supreme Court, touching all phases of the relationships between government and business. Concisely excised opinions, clearly introduced. *About 304 pp. Probably \$2.50.* Ready in January, 1962.




