

The Shakespeare Memorial Theatre in Stratford-upon-Avon was opened on 23 April 1879. This book chronicles the life of that theatre and its acting companies from the time when they were regarded as worthy provincials to the present day when, as the Royal Shakespeare Company, they have become internationally celebrated as one of the great acting companies of the world.

The story starts in the days of Victorian actor-managers like Frank Benson and follows the achievements of a roll-call of distinguished directors, the actors who worked for them, and the productions they starred in.
