CONTRIBUTORS

Ryan M. Alexander is Associate Professor of History at the State University of New York (SUNY) College at Plattsburgh. He is the author of *Sons of the Mexican Revolution: Miguel Alemán and His Generation* (2016). He teaches a wide range of courses on Latin America, including general surveys and classes on slavery, foreign relations, and revolutions, as well as global history and research methods. He is the coordinator of the Latin American Studies program at SUNY Plattsburgh, president of the Association of Global South Studies, and editor-in-chief of the *Journal of Global South Studies*.

Timothy M. James is a professor of history at the University of South Carolina Beaufort, where he teaches colonial and modern Latin American history, historical methods, the history of Human Rights, and American legal history. He is the author of *Mexico's Supreme Court Between Liberal Individual Rights and Revolutionary Social Rights* (2013).

Steve J. Stern is the Alberto Flores Galindo and Hilldale Professor of History, Emeritus, at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he taught Latin American history from 1979 to 2017. Stern's research spans five centuries, varied themes, and multiple regions, from Mexico to the Andes to Chile. Recent honors include the Bolton-Johnson Prize in 2007 for *Battling for Hearts and Minds: Memory Struggles in Pinochet's Chile, 1973–1988* (2006), election to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2012, and the conferral of the title Doctor Honoris Causa by the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú in 2016.

Eyal Weinberg is a postdoctoral fellow in the Institute for Historical Studies at the University of Texas at Austin. His research explores histories of medicine, health, political violence, and human rights in Latin America, with a focus on Brazil. Weinberg is also affiliated with the University of Texas's Bernard and Audre Rapoport Center for Human Rights and Justice.
