THE INSTITUTE OF RENAISSANCE STUDIES of the Oregon Shake-speare Festival was held June 19-August 19, 1972. The following courses were offered: 'Politics and Love in Shakespeare's Plays,' by Robert Meldrum (Washington SU), Associate Director of the Institute for 1972; 'The Plays of the Season in Production,' by Robert Meldrum and Shannon Lee Stewart (Portland Community C); 'Shakespeare Seminar,' led by Professor McNair; 'Individual Reading Projects,' supervised by the entire Institute Faculty.

Akrigg (U of British Columbia); 'Confessions of a Shakespeare Editor,' by Bertrand Evans (Emeritus, U of Calif., Berkeley); 'Shakespearean Acting,' by John R. Elliott, Jr. (U of Calif., Santa Barbara); 'Variations on the Comic: Rabelais, Cervantes, Shakespeare, and Molière,' by Roger Williams (Calif. SU, San Francisco); 'Shakespeare and the Participating Audience,' by Homer D. Swander (U of Calif., Santa Barbara); 'Shakespeare in the Age of Reason' and 'Dr. Johnson's Shakespeare,' by Edwin Nierenberg (Calif. SU, San Francisco); 'Shakespeare: Entertainment for Everyman,' by Louis B. Wright (Dir. Emeritus, Folger L). The Margery Bailey Memorial Lectures were given by Wallace A. Bacon (Northwestern U) on 'The Diseased State of Henry IV, Part II,' and 'Reason and Will in the Disordered World of Troilus and Cressida.'

An Institute for the Performance of Elizabethan Music was given by Stanford University's Department of Music under the direction of George Houle (Dir., N.Y. Pro Musica). Concerts of Elizabethan music and Renaissance music and dance were also offered.

Other activities included backstage tours of the theater, a Tudor fair, a children's Renaissance festival, a Tudor Guild Festival handcraft fair and Renaissance rummage sale, and 'Shakespeare in Action,' an informal series of talks with Festival actors, directors, and staff.

SUMMER SHAKESPEARE 1972. The various festivals throughout the United States, Canada, and England again presented a wide selection of Shakespearean drama, sometimes in repertory with rarely performed plays by other authors.

The American Shakespeare Festival Theatre, Stratford, Connecticut, presented *Julius Caesar* and *Antony and Cleopatra*.

The New York (City) Shakespeare Festival, Central Park, offered Hamlet and Much Ado About Nothing.

The Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Ashland, Oregon, gave both indoor and outdoor performances of *The Taming of the Shrew*, *Love's Labour's Lost*, *Troilus and Cressida*, and *Henry IV*, *Part II*, in repertory.

The Globe of the Great Southwest, Odessa, Texas, presented *The Taming of the Shrew* and *Romeo and Juliet* in repertory with Molière's *The School for Wives*.

The Utah Shakespearean Festival offered The Winter's Tale, King Lear, and The Comedy of Errors.

The Shakespeare Summer Festival of Washington, D.C. gave performances of *Troilus and Cressida*.

The Champlain Shakespeare Festival, Burlington, Vermont, performed *Titus Andronicus*, *As You Like It*, and *The Merry Wives of Windsor* in repertory.

The Stratford (Canada) Festival featured King Lear and As You Like It.

The Royal Shakespeare Festival (England) presented 'The Romans': Coriolanus, Julius Caesar, Antony and Cleopatra, and Titus Andronicus in repertory with The Comedy of Errors, at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, Stratford-upon-Avon, England.

THE SHAKESPEARE COUNCIL OF AMERICA has been organized to provide a forum for scholars, critics, teachers, and producers concerned with the work of Shakespeare. Membership is open to all who are interested in the study of Shakespeare. Members may attend the annual meeting, vote by mail for the President and other officers of the Council, and participate in all its activities. Members are also entitled to receive one of several significant Shakespeare publications without extra cost. Membership is annual, beginning January 1, 1973. The first annual meeting, which will be open only to members, will be held at the Statler Hilton Hotel, Washington, D.C., March 30–31, 1973. Further

THE PIETÀ OF MICHELANGELO, damaged in May 1972, can be satisfactorily repaired, according to RSA member Deoclecio Redig de Campo, Director-General of the Vatican Museums. He said that all fragments had been recovered and that the specialists and artisans of the Vatican Museums' staff were well qualified to undertake the necessary repairs. After restoration the damage should be visible only after close scrutiny.

Hardison, Director, have announced an agreement, subject to the approval of New York State authorities, for the transfer of *Shakespeare Quarterly* to the Folger Shakespeare Library, which will continue publication. The new editor will be Richard J. Schoeck, Director of Research Activities for the Folger Shakespeare Library.

AN INDEX TO THE REGISTERS OF THE STATIONERS' COMPANY (1640–1708) is being prepared by William P. Williams (Northern Illinois U) for publication by the Nether Press, London, England. Undertaken with the permission of the Company, this index will record the appearance of every title, author, editor, translator, stationer, and others connected with the book trade listed in the transcription of the Registers made by G. E. B. Eyre. Since the index is employing data-processing equipment, it may be searched in ways not normally possible when using a conventional printed index. The machine-readable index, which is too costly to print, will be available for subject searches after the conventional index appears in print.
