In Vol. 53, No. 4, a typographical error appears in H. Martin Wobst's review of Clive Gamble's book, *The Paleolithic Settlement of Europe*. In the first paragraph on p. 664, the sentence "(This, of course, works only with high spatial autocorrelation!)" should read "(. . . low spatial autocorrelation!)."

In Vol. 53, No. 4, an omission appeared in Joseph A. Tiffany's book note contribution on *Papers in Northern Plains Prehistory and Ethnohistory*, edited by W. R. Wood.
