THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY ANNOUNCES THE FOLLOWING AVAIL-ABLE FELLOWSHIPS.

The Newberry-British Academy Fellowship for Study in Great Britain. In cooperation with the British Academy, the Newberry Library offers an exchange fellowship for three months' study in any field in the humanities in which the Newberry's collections are strong. Preference will be given to established scholars on the staffs of universities, museums, or libraries, and especially to readers and staff of the Newberry. The stipend is £12 per day in Great Britain with the Fellow's home institution expected to continue a regular salary. Deadline for completed applications: March 1, 1981.

Short-Term Resident Fellowships for Individual Research in any field appropriate to the Newberry's collections. The stipend is \$600 per month for a maximum of three months. Applicants must have completed the Ph.D. or be at the dissertation stage. Preference will be given to applicants who particularly need the Newberry's resources and to those from outside the Chicago area. Deadline for completed applications: March 1 or October 15, 1981.

Resident Fellowships for Unaffiliated Scholars. Stipends of \$250 or \$500 per calendar quarter are available to scholars who have the Ph.D. but who are not professionally employed in their field. Applicants must propose to use the Newberry as a scholarly base and be working on a specific project in a field appropriate to the Newberry's resources. Scholars must spend 6–8 hours a week in residence and participation in the intellectual life of the Library. Stipends may be renewed quarterly up to one year, and afterward fellowship status may be renewed annually, but without stipend. Deadline for completed applications: March 1 or October 15, 1981.

The Hermon Dunlap Smith Center for the History of Cartography offers fellowships for research in the history of cartography of \$600 per month for periods not exceeding three months. Applications may be submitted at any time.

Monticello College Foundation Fellowship for Women. A six-month fellowship for work in residence by a woman scholar with the Ph.D. carries a stipend of \$7,500 and is designed primarily for women at an early stage in their professional careers. Study may be proposed in any

field appropriate to the Newberry's collections, but preference will be given to applicants whose research is particularly concerned with the study of women. Completed applications are due March 1, 1981.

THE CENTRE FOR RENAISSANCE STUDIES, SWISS FEDERAL INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY, Zürich, will hold a conference on the topic "Vita Activa and Vita Contemplativa, from the Greeks to 1700," June 17–19, 1981. Speakers will include Paul Oskar Kristeller (Emeritus, Columbia U), Bernard Beugnot (U of Montréal), and Brian Stock (Inst. of Pontifical Studies, U of Toronto).
