FRANK HOYT WOOD, 1864-1930

Frank Hoyt Wood (Ph.D., Leipzig, 1900), Professor of History, 1902–1916, and since 1916 James Sherman memorial Professor of Political Science at Hamilton College, died on August 22, 1930, at Babylon, L. I. Dr. Wood was one of the most ardent supporters of the science of international law and all efforts toward the peaceful settlement of international disputes. His primary interest was in teaching rather than in research, and his influence was very widespread because of the popularity of his courses in international law and international relations. These he considered as opportunities to increase the ranks of those who strive to look at international relations from a world viewpoint. As a regular attendant at the meetings of the Teachers of International Law, he stressed the need of teaching the principles of international conduct outside the technical law courses. Widely read in the literature of his chosen field, he had travelled in the Orient and in the Near East, as well as in Europe, in order the better to grasp the manifold problems which faced nations in their relations with one another. His colleagues and friends in the American Society of International Law will read with sorrow of this passing of a fellow student.
