Potential benefits may include reduction in submission-to-publication time for disks prepared according to our instructions, and absence of errors associated with re-keying.

- When a paper is in its final form and has been accepted for publication, authors should supply the journal editor with 2 disks, each containing the final version, which must be accompanied by a hard copy print out identical to the version on the disks.
- ⇒ The preferred medium is a 3.5 or 5.25 inch disk in Macintosh or MS-DOS.
- Disks should be clearly labelled with the file name, the date, the author's name, and the hardware and software package used.

  An example of the file name would be JIDMHL the first 3 letters represent the Wiley journal code (this is listed in the Notes for Contributors at the end of this issue) and the next 3 letters the first named author's initials (if an author only has 2 initials the middle letter should be X).

#### NOTES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

- The original and two copies of a manuscript submitted for publication should be sent to the Editor, Sir Arnold Burgen, Department of Pharmacology, Tennis Court Road, Cambridge CB2 1QJ, UK. The Author's full postal address, as well as telephone, telex and fax numbers where available, should appear on the manuscript.
- 2. The language of the Review is English and only original papers, not published elsewhere, will be accepted. The copyright must be assigned to the Publisher by filling in the Publishing Agreement form which will be sent to the prospective author.
- Manuscripts are to be typed double-spaced, with wide top and side margins, on one side of the paper only. Authors are advised to keep one copy of their manuscript for reference. A summary of 100-150 words should be provided.
- 4. Accepted papers should be provided on disk if possible. Two identical disk copies of the final version of the paper should be accompanied by a hard copy. If the disk and the hard copy differ, the hard copy will be used as the definitive version. The disks must be labelled with a six letter acronym representing the journal title (3) and the author's name (3), for example, EURWAC. The label should also include the date, author's name, hardware and software used. Most software is acceptable but WordPerfect, Word or Tex are best.
- 5. The title should be brief. It should appear on a separate sheet, with the Author's name typed on the line below the title.
- 6. The papers should be subdivided into sections and, if necessary, subsections. Authors should submit a brief autobiography of 75–100 words along with the paper.
- 7. Mathematical symbols may be hand-written or typed. Greek letters and unusual signs should be identified separately in the margin. Distinction should be made between letter O and zero, between letter I and number 1 and prime. All abbreviations should be preceded the first time they appear by the full name. Boldface, spacing, and italics for emphasis are to be avoided; the latter are to be used, though, for words taken over from other languages and not integrated in the language of the text.
- 8. Half-tone illustrations are to be restricted in number to the minimum necessary.
- 9. Line drawings should be supplied on a separate sheet at the same size as the intended printed version (so no enlargement or reduction is required), maximum width 127 mm. Lettering on the artwork should be set in 8pt type. Computer-generated artwork must be submitted as laser printed output at a resolution of 600 dots per inch on high quality paper. Dot matrix printer output is unacceptable. Tints are to be avoided; hatching should be used instead. Drawn artwork should be carefully lettered and drawn in black ink. Provide copies as well as the originals.

Black and white photographs should be supplied as sharp, glossy black and white prints (not photocopies or previously printed material). Laser output photographs are to be avoided.

Both drawings and photographs should be clearly identified on the back with the figure number and the author's name.

Artwork on disk is preferred on 3.5 inch PC or Macintosh format disk in a dedicated drawing package, such as Adobe Illustrator/Corel Draw/Macromedia Freehand *not* presentation, spreadsheet or database packages. Each graphic should be in a separate file, should conform to the information above and be supplied as a source (original) file as well as .EPS file, if different. Provide hard copy print out of each figure, clearly identified.

- 10. Footnotes are to be held to a minimum, parentheses in the text are to be preferred. Footnotes are not to be used for bibliographical references.
- 11. References to published literature should be quoted in the text by superior numbers and grouped together at the end of the paper in numerical order. Journal references should be arranged thus:
  - 1. F. Fukuyama, 'The End of History', The National Interest, 16, 3-19 (1989).

Book references should be as follows:

- 2. J. Cadwell, Theory of Fertility Decline, Academic Press, London, 1982.
- For many articles submitted to the publication, it may be more useful to provide a short bibliography under the heading 'Further Reading'.
- 12. No manuscript or illustration will be returned following publication unless a request for return is made at the time when the manuscript is submitted.
- 13. Page proofs are sent to authors for the correction of printers' errors; alterations of the text will not be accepted. Corrected proofs should be returned to the Publisher within 48 hours of receipt.
- 14. Twenty-five offprints of the paper will be provided to the Author free of charge. Additional copies of the article and copies of the Journal may be purchased from the Publisher on an offprint order form supplied with the proofs.
- 15. It is the Author's responsibility to obtain written permission to quote material which has appeared in another publication.
