

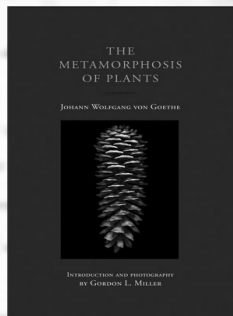
## THE METAMORPHOSIS OF PLANTS

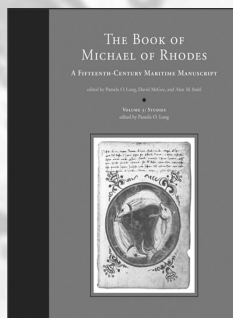

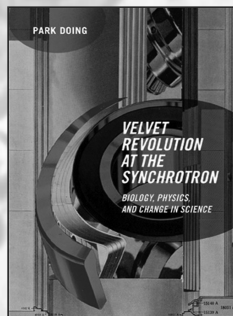
