WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

3 August-7 November 1970

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the brain, and this occupies about five periods.

3 August-28 August 1970

Basic Sciences Class for Students of Neurology.

This course includes 20 lectures on the anatomy of the brain, spinal cord and motor tracts, 6 lectures on the physiological properties and 5 periods of dissection of the brain.

29 June-8 August 1970

INTENSIVE CLINICAL LECTURE PERIOD for Post-Primary Fellowship, Part II D.L.O. and other students.

These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

18 May-30 May 1970 and 4 November-17 November 1970

PRACTICAL REVISION CLASS for Part II D.L.O. students.

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and viva voce examinations.

16 March-1 April 1970 and 28 September-10 October 1970

Advanced Revision Course for students taking higher surgical examinations.

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed overleaf and of the short course on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

A course on the management of Maxillofacial Injuries will be held at the University of Iowa, II-I5 May 1970. Limited to fourteen otolaryngologists, preferably those engaged in academic practice, the course will deal with the immediate and delayed treatment of injuries to the soft tissues and underlying skeletal structures of the face, and with associated dental problems. In addition to lectures and demonstrations, ample laboratory practice will be given in methods of open and closed reduction, interdental fixation and suture techniques.

INDUSTRIAL INJURIES ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Industrial Injuries Advisory Council has been asked to consider whether there are degrees of hearing loss attributable to exposure to noise in the course of employment which satisfy the conditions for prescription as an industrial disease laid down by Section 56(2) of the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Act 1965. The Council has also been asked to consider what arrangements would need to be made in the event of prescription to deal with claims for benefit and what, if any, special conditions should be placed on eligibility for benefit under the Act. These questions were referred to the Council by the Secretary of State for Social Services, the Rt. Hon. Richard Crossman, M.P.

The Council are prepared to receive evidence from any interested persons or organizations who should communicate with the Secretary to the Council, Mr. A. C. Palmer, at 10 John Adam Street, London, WC2, as soon as possible and in any event not later than 1 June 1970. An explanatory memorandum will be supplied on request.

TEMPORAL BONE DISSECTION—SURGERY COURSE

The Los Angeles Foundation of Otology announces a two-week temporal bone dissection course demonstrating the multiple approaches to the structures of the temporal bone as currently used by the members of the Otologic Medical Group.

The course members will be divided each day to observe televised surgery that will correlate with the dissections of the day. Evenings will be devoted to lectures and motion picture demonstrations.

The instructors will dissect in the temporal bone laboratory over closed circuit television and each student will be supervised as the various procedures and approaches are performed.

Twenty otolaryngologists and residents will be accepted in each course, the first of which will be given on 29 March 1970. Subsequent courses will be presented beginning 5 July 1970, and 18 October 1970. The tuition for otolaryngologists is \$1,000 and for residents \$500.
